Masks are no longer compulsory inside buildings in Spain from 20th April. Exceptions include medical centres, care homes and public transport while employers will have the right to decide whether to make masks obligatory in the workplace The decision to lift the mask rule is being welcomed by some but treated with caution by others, who believe it is still too soon.

On 6th April the Health Minister Carolina Darias insisted that the time is right to make this move, due to the way the pandemic is evolving and because of Spain's high vaccination rate: 92.5 per cent of the population is fully vaccinated against Covid, she said. So from the 20th April, masks will only be compulsory in medical centres and hospitals, care homes and on public transport.

The Health Minister also confirmed that companies will

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have the right to make masks obligatory in their workplace if they so wish, and she said they will still have to be worn in pharmacies and blood transfusion centres because those are considered medical environments. Masks will not be obligatory for teachers or pupils, unless they are vulnerable. It has also been confirmed that the authorities will still be recommending "responsible use" of masks when 1.5-metre social distance cannot be maintained and in places without adequate ventilation.

Triple A to receive €80,000 from Marbella Town Hall Triple A animal welfare association is currently in temporary premises while new facilities are being built which will enable it to look after even more abandoned animals

Marbella council and Triple A have signed a collaboration agreement under which the animal welfare association will receive €80,000 so it can continue its work with abandoned animals in the municipality. The agreement was signed by the mayor, Ángeles Muñoz, and Triple A president Elise Dunweber, and it is similar to those of recent years. At present the association and its volunteers are caring for more than 500 animals, which are mainly dogs and cats, although there are some other species. "They work very hard to

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Estate planning

Estate planning is one of those tasks that is easy to keep putting off, but do not risk leaving it too late. If you do, your estate may not be distributed as you wish, and your heirs could end up paying more tax than they need have. **British expatriates living** in Spain need to be aware of, and plan for, a number of inheritance issues.

Your last will and testament

If you live in Spain, it is advisable to make a Spanish will to deal with your Spanish assets. It is much easier to wind up an estate using a local will, rather than one established in another country.

A UK will may be effective in Spain, but it will have to go through the UK probate process. This will inevitably create long delays and high costs, as well as having to be notarised and translated before being accepted in Spain.

If you have assets in the UK, you can have a will for each country. If you make a Spanish will, and subsequently change your UK one, make sure your solicitor does not inadvertently revoke the Spanish one.

Spanish succession law

In the UK you are generally free to distribute your estate as you wish (Scotland does have some restrictions). Spanish succession law, however, imposes 'forced heirship' rules. In general terms, children are entitled to receive two thirds of an estate's assets so you cannot, for example, leave everything to your spouse. This Spanish succession

law will apply to foreign nationals living in Spain by default.

You can however use the **European Succession** Regulation, 'Brussels IV', to opt for the succession law of your country of nationality to apply on your death instead. But you must specifically state this in your will, otherwise distribution of your estate will follow the law of your country of residence. Brussels IV applies to all foreign nationals living in an EU country, it is not restricted to EU citizens, so Brexit has not changed anything here. Note that Brussels IV only relates to succession law. You cannot use it to opt for UK inheritance tax instead of Spanish succession tax on death.

Spanish succession and gift tax

Inheritance tax in Spain works very differently to UK inheritance tax. Tax is paid by each recipient, not the estate, and tax rate varies depending on the relationship between the person passing the money and the person receiving the money.

There is no blanket spouse to spouse exemption.

Spanish succession and gift tax is due if the asset being inherited or gifted is located in Spain (regardless of where the recipient lives), or if the recipient is resident in Spain (regardless of where the assets are located).

The state tax rates start at 7.65% and rise to 34%. Multipliers based on the familial relationship and beneficiary's net worth can take tax rates much higher.

There are some reductions and allowances but at

state level they are low. Spouses, descendants and ascendants only receive a reduction of €15,957; it is lower (or nil) for everyone else. Also, there is a 95% reduction against the inherited value of the main home, but only for spouses or descendants who keep the property for at least 10 years. This deduction is capped at €122,606 per inheritor. However, the autonomous communities can adjust the tax rates, allowances and reductions to make them more beneficial for residents in the different Spanish regions. Here in Andalucía the local succession tax regime has been reformed over the last couple of years to make it one of the most attractive regions in Spain for succession tax planning.

UK inheritance tax

Many British expatriates remain liable to UK inheritance tax since it is based on domicile rather than residence. This means your estate could be liable to both UK and Spanish inheritance taxes, but a credit is given in Spain for the tax paid in the UK to avoid double taxation.

provide the best living conditions for these pets," said Muñoz, and the council is not just contributing to the running costs but also funding the construction of new kennels at a cost of 1.2 million euros. The new facilities will enable Triple A to look after even more abandoned animals. "Animal wellbeing is a priority for us," said the mayor.

While the construction work is being carried out, the town hall has provided temporary premises for the association and the animals in its care.

Firefighters rescue.

Firefighters rescued a man who fell several metres down La Concha mountain in Marbella. The Scandinavian visitor had an eight-centimetre-long gash in his leg and was taken to hospital in the 061 emergency helicopter. The young Scandinavian man had fallen several metres while trying to climb La Concha mountain. He was with a group of friends when the accident happened, in a rocky area of the Cerro del Lago, above the road to Istán, which is difficult to access and not on a prepared track.

Cudeca announces return of its annual walkathon. After two years of celebrating its Benalmádena solidarity walk virtually, the event will return in its usual format and will include a whole day of activities, such as a Holi party and live music. The Cudeca Foundation has announced that the traditional Walkathon will return in its usual format on Saturday 28th May. The walk, which will offer a five and ten kilometre route, will begin from the Hotel Sunset Beach in Benalmádena Costa and continue along the main coastal road. As well as the sponsored walk, this year's event will offer a whole day of activities due to the collaboration of the activity and events company Exploramás. These include a Hindu Festival of Colours party (Holi), where participants are pelted with coloured powder to celebrate the arrival of spring. There will also be live music supplied by local band iPop, who perform a variety of music from the 1980s and '90s; as well as children's entertainment, and free paella for all walkers. The ten-kilometre route will begin at 10.30am, while the five kilometre walk will start one hour later. Registration can be made through the charity's website www.cudeca.org, and costs ten euros for adults and seven euros for children under 16 years of age. Bib numbers can be collected from the hotel entrance on the day of the walk.

New larger health centre in Torre del Mar.

A new, larger health centre in Torre del Mar planned in next couple of years. Officials from the regional government and local council have visited the site designated for the new facility. After a decade of waiting, Torre del Mar could be one step closer to having its new health centre in a few years' time. The current health centre has become too small due to the significant increase in the population of the town.

The Junta de Andalucía delegate for Health and Families, Carlos Bautista, expressed his "firm commitment" to this action while on a visit to the plot of land donated for the health centre by the town council in the last plenary session. The new centre will house the mental health unit, and will have 24 consultation rooms, four more paediatric rooms, social workers office, physiotherapy and radiology units among others.

Torrox home demolished.

A British pensioners' home in Torrox has been demolished by the council. The local authority was ordered by a judge

to knock the house down because it had been built illegally and the owners had failed to comply with a demolition order from 2011

Torrox council has begun to demolish a house owned by a British couple in the rural Santilla area, because what they built did not comply with the licence they were granted by the town hall in 2002 and the property is therefore illegal. The council is acting in compliance with a court order dating back to 2011, which ordered the demolition for an offence against land regulation.

According to the court documents, in the year 2000 the couple bought a 1,451 square metre plot of land with a 21 m2 house in ruins on it. The land is not classified for construction under the Urban Plan, so building is not permitted unless a plot is more than 25,000 m2 in size. In 2002 the owners obtained a licence from the council to reinforce the walls and replace the roof of the ruin, but not increase its size. The licence did permit a swimming pool to be added. However, what they built was "a new detached family house with a basement, swimming pool and asphalted exterior, with an irregular shape and a surface area of 240 m2," the papers say.

In 2011 a judge sentenced the couple to eight months in prison, fined them 5,400 euros, banned them from any activities related to construction or property development for one year and ordered them to pay all costs. He also ordered them to demolish the parts of the property that had been built illegally. They did not comply.

The demolition costs are €28,700. In September 2021 the court wrote to the town hall and insisted that the property be demolished with no further delay. All that will be left is a 21 m2 building, in accordance with the original licence. The works are costing the council €28,700.56, which the owners are liable to pay.

PP party enters coalition with far-right Vox in a Spanish region for the first time.

The regional coalition government between the conservative Partido Popular (PP) and far-right Vox has been sworn in in the northern region of Castilla y León. It is the first time that Vox has entered a regional government anywhere in Spain. Alfonso Fernández Mañueco of the PP has been sworn in as president and Vox's Juan García-Gallardo will be vice president. Although Vox's high profile national leader, Santiago Abascal, was at the swearing-in ceremony in the regional parliament in Valladolid, the national PP leader, Alberto Núñez Feijóo, did not attend.

Half of drivers in Spain admit to using a mobile at the wheel.

Almost half of drivers in Spain admit that they use their mobile phone at the wheel. The new traffic law which came into force last month regards this as a serious distraction and the penalties are more severe than before. Since Spain's new Traffic Law came into force last month, anyone caught holding or using a mobile phone while driving faces a fine of €200 and losing six points from their licence, because this is one of the main causes of driver distraction and they are four times more likely to have an accident. The same applies to changing a GPS route device while driving.

Many people use satellite navigation systems to find their way around, and they can be very useful but it is essential that the routes are set before beginning a journey or the vehicle should pull off the road if the GPS needs to be reset, because the law treats this as a similar offence to the use of a mobile phone while driving.



Under the new law, drivers must not hold a mobile phone in their hand while at the wheel, even if they are stationary such as in a traffic jam or waiting at traffic lights. Their use is only permitted when the engine is switched off and the vehicle is parked off the road in a place where it does not interfere with traffic flow.

More than half of all births in Malaga province are to parents who are not married.

The way families have evolved in the past 40 years reflects a new social reality which differs from the traditional model. Family households in Malaga province have changed in the past 40 years, in terms of family structures. The hegemony of a married couple with children has been left behind and now, in the 21st century, there is a new social reality with family groups coexisting alongside the traditional model: single-person households, two-parent, single parent, childless, with children, couples with no formalised relationship, families where parents have separated or rebuilt from previous relationships. The traditional format now lives alongside options which would have been completely unimaginable at one time. To give an example for context, more than half of all babies born in Malaga are to parents who are not married (55.09%), when in the 1980s the percentage was barely 4.5%.

Malaga City Festival.

Andalucá Big Festival to bring major names to Malaga in September. Muse and Jamiroquai have already confirmed their appearance. The three day music event on Sacaba Beach is expected to attract 100,000 people including 30,000 from abroad, say the organisers.

Barcelona, Madrid, Lisbon and Paris is the normal route in Europe for international bands on tour. "It is really difficult to get them to come to other places," say Javier Arnaiz and Farruco Castromán, who run the Mad Cool promotions company, but they decided to set themselves a challenge: "We want them to come to Malaga every year," they explain.

Their idea is to bring big names to Andalucía Big Festival, a macro-event which is expected to attract over 100,000 people to Malaga city from 8th to 10th September this year. Two international stars have already signed up: Muse and Jamiroquai, for what will be their only date in Europe. There will be 52 bands altogether, but so far the names of only half of them have been released. "The rest won't disappoint," say the organisers. They will play on three stages in the 50,000 square metre arena next to the beach. Tickets will be put on sale once the programme is complete.

Andalucía proposes giving fourth Covid jab. Andalucía proposes giving a 4th Covid jab to elderly people in residential homes. More than six months have passed since they had their third dose of the vaccine and their immunity is wearing off. The Junta de Andalucía is putting pressure on the government to allow elderly people in residential homes to be given a fourth dose of the coronavirus vaccine, and maybe even those over the age of 70 who live in their homes.

Spain has taken in 110,000 Ukrainian refugees to date. Around 110,000 Ukrainian refugees have arrived in Spain since the conflict broke out, and 47,000 have so far been granted asylum, national president Pedro Sánchez reveals. This week, he has visited three of the four refugee welcome centres set up to handle arrivals' immediate needs before rehousing them elsewhere in the country, depending upon resources available in different regions or, where applicable, close to family members they already have living in Spain. Sánchez has been to the centres in Alicante, Madrid and, more recently, Barcelona, and had scheduled a visit to the hub in Málaga.

Although only 47,000 of the 110,000 have acquired 'special temporary protection' – which includes a three year residence visa and work permit, possibly to be extended if the conflict continues or the arrivals fee I settled in Spain and want to stay put – the State authorities are working through the list and all refugees from Ukraine will be given automatic leave to remain eventually.

Ukrainians who were already living in Spain before the invasion and did not yet have legal residence will be granted this based upon their nationality alone, or if their permit is due to expire, this will be renewed without question, given that it is unsafe for anyone originally from Ukraine to return to their home country for the foreseeable future.

Costa del Sol towns to set up emissions-free zone. Seven towns on the Costa del Sol are due to set up 'lowemissions zones' thanks to European Union funding. Air pollution is directly responsible for around seven million deaths worldwide per year – about one in every 1,000 inhabitants - and transport is the biggest generator of unclean air; also, carbon dioxide emissions trap heat within the earth's atmosphere, contributing to climate change and extreme weather. To this end, towns all over Spain with a population of 50,000 or more are now

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
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required to create low-emissions zones, and can claim cash from the EU Next Generation Fund to help them out. Estepona will receive just over €1.5 million to keep its air clean. This goes beyond merely banning cars from a town-centre area, as people and goods need to get about, so it covers public transport reinforcement, cycle lanes and electrically-powered vehicles, among other actions. Even planting trees may fall within the scope of the funding, since they are one of the planet's best allies against air pollution - they 'drink' CO2 and pump out oxygen. Cash awarded to major Costa del Sol holiday hotspots will be substantial, and is based upon the size of their population. The largest amount goes to Málaga city, just over €10 million followed by Vélez-Málaga with a little over €3.7 million and Benalmádena with nearly €2.9 million. TIME TO FORMALLY BECOME A TAX RESIDENT IN SPAIN.

According to the Spanish Law all individuals who are living in Spain for more than 183 days a year are tax residents in Spain and have to pay taxes in Spain for their worldwide income.

Many foreigners living in Spain permanently, (for more than 183 days a year), do not pay any taxes in Spain, or submit annual income tax returns. Some do not submit annual tax returns out of ignorance of the law, and others because they are afraid of paying high taxes. Everyone should be aware that ignorance of the law is no excuse, A Tax return should be submitted annually, and taxes should be paid when applicable by all tax residents in Spain. In the past the Spanish Inland Revenue has not controlled the situation of those foreigners living permanently in Spain, despite the fact that authorities are aware of this important group of people. Some years ago the situation changed, and due to the financial crisis, the Spanish Government intended to tighten up its control of all foreigners living in Spain to ensure that they pay taxes where due, and thus avoid thousands of people receiving free health services without paying taxes and without having the legal right to get them. The Spanish Government decided to be stricter with the legal requirements that allow people to get Spanish health cards so it is not enough to just register with the local Town Hall (called "Empadronamiento") in order to get treatment.

Therefore, NOW is the time to formally become a tax resident in Spain by submitting your annual income tax return for the tax year 2021, this should be done during the months of May and June 2022.

There are many good reasons for doing this. It will enable foreign residents to:

- **1** Confirm to the Spanish tax authorities without doubt, that they, the tax resident, is living in Spain, and paying taxes when applicable.
- 2 Have the legal right to receive a health card which allows

access to the Spanish Public health system.

- **3** Avoid the 3 % withholding tax when a real estate property is sold. This tax is applicable to foreigners who sell a property and cannot prove that they are a tax resident in Spain.
- **4** Benefit from the inheritance tax advantages and allowances applicable to tax residents in Spain (i.e. no inheritance taxes between spouses on the main home).
- **5** Be considered a tax resident in Spain, thus avoiding the income tax applicable to non-resident foreigners who are owners of a real estate property in Spain (tax form 210).

It is important to mention that most foreigners living in Spain are pensioners with low monthly pensions, so they should be aware that they probably will not have to pay any income tax in Spain as the result of their tax return would most likely be zero. However, it is still recommendable to submit an annual tax return, (even if the result is zero and no tax has to be paid), to enable them to be able to take advantage of the above points.

CONCLUSION: If you are foreigner living permanently in Spain (for more than 183 days a year) we would recommend that you submit an annual income tax return during the months of May and June for the tax year 2021. By doing this, you will confirm to the Spanish Tax Authorities that you are, without doubt, a tax resident in Spain, you will avoid any potential problems or fines, and will have all the legal rights that the Spanish Laws recognizes are due to all individuals residing legally in Spain and duly paying their taxes here

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The Dog-Friendly Garden

Cute picture right! This was taken a few years back when this hoop house was almost all the gardening space I had. It was Mothers day and we had been out all day. A quick Trader Joes pre-packaged dinner was in order. We started to set up a little table and chairs, and food in the hoop house. We went indoors for the rest of what we needed and came out to find this. Whiski decided it was a good spot for him to enjoy dinner! Surprisingly he did not get into the food that was on the table, but that was probably because we were back out before he could. What does this have to do with gardening you ask? My dogs are always in the garden when I am out there and I am guessing yours are too.

It is on Rebecca's Nelson's suggestion that I write this post to consider the plants that are safe and beneficial for our dogs. For many of us, there's a dog or two, or even more that keep us company as we tend our gardens. It may be time to think about what plants



would be good for them. Dogs are natural explorers and having plants that are safe and enjoyable for them in the garden space means peace of mind for you and more fun stimulation for them.

Over the years I have noticed that my dogs always nibbled on young corn plants and even lemongrass. When I first noticed this, I started planting a small pot of pet grass for them to

enjoy. However, they eat much more from the garden than just a few blades of grass. There are many veggies, herbs, and even some fruits that are beneficial to our best friends. When considering any suggestions, always be mindful of allergies your pet may have.

Grass For Dogs

Dogs have always instinctively nibbled at grasses. Grass contains essential

minerals and nutrients that are beneficial, improves digestion, and in some cases soothes an upset stomach. Additionally, it is possible that they simply enjoy the taste of it! Regular summer and winter lawns are fine for nibbling, but make sure they are not treated with chemical herbicides and pesticides. Grass also provide a cushy spot for a little dog nap. Plant the following to keep your dog well

supplied with a bit of grassiness.

Corn:

Good for aiding digestion, rich in minerals.

Oat straw:

Very nutritious and helps with dry skin conditions and coats.

Strengthens the immune system, aids digestion, and improves skin and coat.

Wheatgrass:

Rich in iron, calcium, magnesium ,and many more nutrients. It is also a source of protein.

Millet: Another good source of minerals and some iron. All grasses are rich in chlorophyll which improves overall wellbeing and oxygenates and builds blood.

A few taller ornamental grasses would also be fun for your best friend to play games of hide and seek. Do not use foxtail grass as it is very harmful to animals.

Note: Some dogs are allergic to grasses. It would be best to keep grass out of the garden for these dogs.

Make your own highly nutritious pet grass blend by combining wheatgrass, barley, millet, and oat straw seeds in any ratio. Do not use pearled barley from the grocery store, it will not germinate. It is easy to do this even if you live in an apartment and only have a small patio. If the pet grass grows much faster than your dog is enjoying it, snip off the extras, and use as green manure on your other plants. They will keep growing back and planting can be refreshed 2-3 times a year.

Herbs For Dogs

Herbs are beneficial in the diet, for grooming purposes, and to help when dogs are not feeling too well.

Thyme: Use in food to help with digestion and as a breath freshener. Patches of thyme will also help to repel bugs.

Oregano: Rich in antioxidants and helps with digestion, gas, and diarrhea.

Rosemary: High in calcium, iron, and vitamin B6. Use to flavor meals. Rosemary is also excellent as a tea added to the rinse water on bath day. It soothes skin and keeps away bugs.

Peppermint: Peppermint is helpful for upset tummies, and even travel sickness. Too much peppermint can affect the kidneys, use in small doses.

Basil: Besides being yummy, basil also has antioxidant, antiviral, and antimicrobial properties. Add chopped basil to your dog's food as often as possible. Don't forget holy basil which is and adaptogenic and supports overall wellbeing and helps the body to better cope with stress factors.

Parsley: An excellent addition to your dog's meal. It is known for its breath freshening properties but it is also rich in antioxidants, lycopene, and carotenes.

Plantain: This is an excellent herb to have in the garden for both dogs and humans. Plantain herb(Plantago major) should not be confused with plantain banana. Plantain is used when there is a bit of trouble. It has "drawing" properties, drawing out toxins from the body. It can be used as a tea added to the drinking water, as an oil both topically and internally, and even ripped into thin strips and fed to a dog. If a dog gets into something concerning this is one of the best herbs to have on hand. Together with calendula, it is also excellent to calm and treat scorpion stings by using externally and internally.

Vegetables For Dogs

Most dogs will develop a fondness for a large variety of vegetables. They can be offered as treats or added to meals. Here are some of the easiest ones to add to your dog's diet.

Carrots: There is seldom a dog who will turn down carrots. They love the crunch and sweetness. Older dogs will appreciate softer cooked carrots. (my sweet Noel knew where the carrots were planted and would stand next to some when she wanted a fresh-picked carrot). Not all dogs will be as polite, be prepared for some to help themself to the goodies once they have discovered where it has been planted.

Radishes: Some may enjoy these, others may not. Radishes are not harmful to dogs and once again it is the crunch they really enjoy. Radishes are part of the brassica family and should be given in moderation. Celery: Great as a breath freshener but few dogs will really take celery if offered. It is better used added to their food.

Beets: Be prepared for some messiness if feeding red beets. This is one bestfed outside(or you may find it being enjoyed on the white sofa)! Steamed beets are a great addition to dog food or as a treat.



The Importance of Puppy Training

Bringing a new puppy home is full of excitement and responsibility. A well-trained puppy has the opportunity to be at your side in a variety of environments and activities. They also have the confidence and social skills to interact with other people and dogs in a safe way

Every owner dreams of having a well-behaved puppy, but the reality is it takes puppy training, consistent practice, and patience before a puppy can grow up to be that way! Many puppy owners become discouraged early on and some don't ever enroll their puppy in professional puppy training to begin with. The outcome, unfortunately in certain cases, ends up the same where puppies grow up with behavioural issues. Maturing into an adult dog without the chance of puppy training leaves many of these pups at risk of finding themselves re-homed or in a shelter.

I've learned over the that the biggest issues that puppy owners face is the lack of access to support, having structured learning plans, and proper instruction to apply those puppy training skills. So, if you brought home a new puppy and aren't sure if puppy training is the right investment, I can assure you it is! An investment in your long-term happiness together and for their well-being!

In the past, Puppy School may not have been seen as an important responsibility when bringing a new puppy into the family. However, we now understand the importance of socialisation and early training in our puppies during the crucial imprinting stage between 8 and 18 weeks of age. Puppy School is targeted specifically to puppies of this age to expose them to a variety of people (males, females, tall, short, lanky, round, glasses, beards etc) and a variety of dogs (large, small, fluffy, smooth, timid and boisterous) to learn how to interact appropriately with them in a safe and controlled environment. This is the first step in developing a balanced adult who is confident and friendly around people and dog. It's important to continue socialising your dog to as many sights, sounds, and smells as possible throughout adolescence, but this early imprinting period is seen as perhaps the most important. Archaeologists suspect that the sandal was worn with fabric or animal skin fashioned as a primitive sock. The Roman attributes of the sandal seem to suggest that ancient people had contact with the outside world, according to archaeologists. In the fall of 2019, a hiker notified archaeologists in Norway about a curious find in the Jotunheim Mountains, a raggedy shoe. Well aware that the melting ice often revealed ancient treasures, a team from Secrets of the Ice went to investigate and found a 1,700-year-old sandal.

"[The hiker] sent us GPS coordinates and photos, and left the discovery in the ice," archaeologist Espen Finstad of Secrets of the Ice told Live Science, noting that his team had to act fast to recover the sandal from an area of the Lendbreen ice patch before a snowstorm.

The archaeologists then examined the sandal. Using radiocarbon dating, they determined that it originated in 300 C.E., or some 1,700 years ago. Though they've uncovered numerous shoes, this is the oldest they've ever found, and it's unique in its construction.

But they wondered how the sandal had ended up in the snowy mountains in the first place.

"I do a lot of hiking in the mountains, and you know, I find myself thinking, why would you wear that shoe



up here... it's just very open," Finstad told Science Norway. "Full of patterns and holes. But it was there. We found it on the ice." The sandal, Finstad explained, looks stylistically like Roman sandals of the same era.

Though it seems impractical for the ice and snow, he suspects that its owner wore it in a way that protected their feet. "It's easy to joke about a Roman tourist who didn't quite understand much about the



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country he was visiting," Finstad said . "But in any case, I believe the people who walked these routes most likely knew what they were doing. They would have worn something inside this shoe that made it work. Perhaps scraps of fabric or animal skin." Indeed, archaeologists suspect that the sandal wasn't lost by a hapless hiker. Instead, it was probably discarded once it became damaged or worn. "Why did people lose their footwear in the snow?" Secrets of the Ice archaeologist Lars Pilø wrote on Twitter. "They probably didn't — the shoes are worn out and probably thrown away as rubbish." He added: "Well, we don't think this shoe is rubbish." Finstad said that his team found more than the Roman sandal when they investigated the area — they also recovered "horse dung, textiles, leaf fodder, arrow shafts, and other items.

Finds like these, he said, illustrate the rich history of Norway's lonely mountain passes, which were once traversed by travellers and traders.

"It tells us that what today looks like a wild and desolate mountain landscape has been a prehistoric traffic landscape and that it is full of traces of humans," he explained. "People have not been afraid to move out into tough mountain areas. They have travelled long distances and had contact and exchange."

To Science Norway, he said, "You have this vast wilderness, with no traces of humans. But then you realize it's actually brimming with clues.

Little clues at first, but then when they multiply, and you can see them all together, this whole new story appears."

Secrets of the Ice has investigated sites like this for over a decade, and each new find builds a more complete picture of how ancient people used the mountains.

Recently, the archaeological team also uncovered 1,700-year-old reindeer hunting tools, including arrows, at the mountains peak of Sandgrovskardet. "It's a giant puzzle," Finstad said.

"We've been close to figuring out where these mountain passes go for a while, we've been out there looking for clues. And then these finds appear and reveal one of them. It's just very exciting."

Chickpea, Carrot & Parsley Salad



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

20 Simple Health Habits

- 1. Drink a gallon of water every day. Drinking more water can impact brain health, heart health, and body weight in positive ways.
- 2. Walk for 30 minutes every day.
- 3. Do 25-50 lunges daily.
- 4. Do 50 heel raises.
- 5. Do 25 sit ups.
- 6. Eat one piece of fruit. When it comes to vitamins and minerals, people turn to supplements. And while supplements are great, fruits are a healthy natural source.
- 7. Make sure your plate consists of equal proportions of protein, a source of minerals and vitamins (vegetables), and

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
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POST TRAUMATIC STRESS DISORDER

Post traumatic stress disorder or PTSD first became recognised as a diagnosable condition in the 1970s, mainly due to the treatment of veterans of the Vietnam war. Further research then started to draw attention to the effects of trauma caused, not only by war, but by physical, sexual and verbal abuse, serious accidents, work related events, serious health issues and natural disasters. In recent years the social isolation and financial stress caused by Covid has increased the numbers of sufferers worldwide.

SYMPTOMS OF PTSD

- 1. Always being alert for danger normally when danger triggers a stress response of fight, flight or freeze, our bodies and minds react quickly. We experience physical changes such as the release of adrenaline and cortisol, increased blood flow and tension to the muscles and rapid heartbeat and breathing, all of which prepare us to escape. When the danger is over, our bodies go back to a relaxed state. But with PTSD your body is nearly always in a heightened state of alert.
- 2. Intrusive thoughts or 'flashbacks'. These include distressing memories or feelings around what happened to you and can be triggered by sounds, smells or similar surroundings.
- 3. Heightened anxiety and fear. There may be obvious triggers or you may simply experience these feelings at random moments with no conscious recollection of why.
- 4. Trouble sleeping or nightmares. The heightened state of alertness often makes it difficult to go to, or stay, asleep as you never truly feel safe. Nightmares may also be flashbacks or they can be the subconscious mind trying to bring to your attention past issues that need to be dealt with.
- 5. Irritability, angry outbursts or aggression. Often PTSD sufferers have not been safely allowed to express their anger in the past. Repressed anger and other emotions have to be expressed eventually and this may occur in unwanted and uncontrolled situations. There is a saying, 'the feeling that cannot find its expression in tears will cause other organs to weep'. In other words, if tears of anger, hurt and sadness are not given free expression then they may cause physical illness in the body as well as behavioural issues.
- 6. Feelings of guilt and shame, especially having experienced childhood trauma or survivor's guilt. This guilt and shame is a serious issue often linking to depression, social anxiety, low-self-esteem and suicidal thoughts.



Neuropathic Pain

ANY FORM OF PAIN can be challenging for even the most astute physician. Neuropathic or nerve pain is particularly complicated to treat effectively for a variety of reasons, from a lack of an obvious source to the inability of the patients to describe their pain, to previous poor manage-ment with the wrong medications, allowing the pain to progress to a seemingly unmanageable state. Neuropathic pain has many diverse etiologies, including infections, inflammation, trauma, metabolic abnormalities. chemotherapy, surgery, radiation, neurotoxins, nerve compression, and tumor infiltration. The presentation of neuropathic pain varies from patient to patient. 'Allodynia' is pain resulting from a normally non-painful stimulus (the touch of clothing or bedding). An exaggerated pain response to a painful stimulus (a pinprick) is termed 'hyperalgesia'. Patients may also complain of 'hypoesthesia' or diminished sensations, 'paresthesia' or an abnormal sensation (e.g. crawling insects, walking on broken glass or fire), constant burning, sharp, shooting or stabbing electrical currents. Neuropathic pain can be symmetrical affecting the area of distribution of the nerves, or it can be asymmetrical and diffused. It may or may not be associated with other neurological symptoms such as numbness and weakness. Currently, we don't have a 'gold standard' objective test to confirm the presence or absence of neuropathic pain. Diagnostic studies, including imaging and nerve conduction studies, do not correlate well to the severity of pain. This makes a

carefully elicited description of neuropathic pain symptoms from the patient and a detailed clinical assessment critical to make a good diagnosis, understand the underlying mechanism, and determine the most appropriate and effective approach for managing neuropathic pain. Many people with neuropathic pain are often given escalating doses of opioids in an attempt to control their discomfort; it is not until much later that they are sent to pain management specialists. Opioids are rarely a good choice for the sole treatment of neuropathic pain.

Neuropathic pain medications, which include certain antidepressants and anti-epileptics (indicated for specific types of neuropathic pain), are rarely discussed with these patients in the early stages, and, unfortunately, are often first mentioned late in the disease's progression. Moreover, when I start suggesting these medications for the treatment of neuropathic

pain some patients give me a doubting look with a few saying 'I'm not crazy, I need a higher dose of meds... my pain is off the scale' or 'I'm in pain not depressed.' Controlling this neuropathic pain is an uphill battle for both patients and physicians alike. Whereas nocioceptive pain can usually be pinpointed to an actual event (pain from a broken bone), neuropathic pain is vague and nondescript in nature. For many physicians, there is no sense of need to pull out the details from the ambiguity; a opioid pain killer prescription is given and the patient is out of the surgery. Except the discomfort most likely continues, with the patient now at risk for drug dependency, a whole new problem.

The following therapies for chronic pain can help enhance the quality of life and the ability to function for people living with neuropathic pain:

Pharmacological therapies – e.g., nonsteroidal antiinflammatory drugs (NSAIDS), analgesics, tricyclic antidepressants, selective serotonin and norepinephrine re-uptake inhibitors (SSNRI), anticonvulsants, opioids. **Topical therpaies** – e.g., lidocaine patch, capsaicin patch.

Interventional therapies – e.g., nerve blocks, trigger point injections.

– e.g., neurolytic procedures
(e.g., destruction of the
offending nerve),
neuroawgmentatioin
techniques (e.g., spinal cord
stimulators), intrathecal
drug delivery systems.
Rehabilitative therapies –
e.g., physical therapy,
occupational therapy.

Complimentary therapies

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The Benefits of Therapeutic Exercise in Cancer Patients:- During & After Treatment


Physical exercise...always, but even better during and after the illness.

Cancer and its treatment cause an enormous impact that totally changes the life of those who suffer from it. It affects their autonomy, their mobility, their selfesteem, their ability to concentrate, their diet... That is precisely why we must think of a multidisciplinary approach to alleviate the side effects that the treatments are going to generate. If we understand the disease as a continuous line in time, we can better understand the importance of physical exercise in each of the cancer phases. Just as there are drugs and exact doses based on the type of cancer, patient, phase... there are also exercises and exact doses based on the same variables.

Physical Activity in Each Phase

Exercise from the time of diagnosis to the start of treatment

This is a key moment, absolutely undervalued and usually misused. Tolerance to treatment depends, to a large extent, on the state of health with which we arrive at the beginning of it. Therefore, it is essential





that we take advantage of those days/weeks to improve our physical capacity.

Exercise during treatment

Adverse side effects will occur during treatment that will reduce the person's quality of life, independence, and functionality.

For example: fatigue associated with cancer. It is a special fatigue, oversized before any effort and that, unlike common fatigue, it does not disappear while sleeping or resting, but it can be reduced o r mitigated through physical exercise.

General joint pain caused by hormonal therapies, loss of mobility in treated areas, either due to surgery or radiotherapy, neuropathy, loss of coordination and balance (which increase the risk of falls) are also clear examples of side effects whose best and sometimes only treatment is therapeutic physical exercise.

Furthermore, tolerance to chemotherapy toxicity is





directly related to the patient's muscular status. When this is very poor (sarcopenia) it becomes a limiting factor for the continuity or management of treatment doses.

Exercise in cancer survivors

Fortunately today, survival rates for most types of cancer are increasing, even reaching 90% for some types of cancer, such as breast cancer.

At the vascular level, for example, training makes us more resistant to atherosclerosis – deposits of fatty plaques, cholesterol, calcium and other substances found in the blood inside the arteries – and, therefore, improves high blood pressure (HBP). The adaptations produced by physical exercise in the cardiovascular system and its benefits for health are multiple, since a trained heart has an easier time continuing to function in the event of a blockage in an artery.

The neurological system also benefits by downregulating the nervous system and therefore making us more resistant to arrhythmias.

To finish, we must talk about another of the most powerful and destructive consequences of cancer treatments: bone mineral weakness that, in an advanced stage, we know as osteoporosis. Once again, exercise helps us to counteract this effect through the so-called osteogenic activities, that is, bone builders:

- Small jumps: the impact against the ground stimulates the creation of bone.
- Strength training: Muscle contraction generates tensions in the bone that favour bone growth.
- Vibratory training: produces reflex muscle contractions that increase bone mineral density (only in people who have overcome the disease)
 All this supposes an improvement in the quantity and quality of life, that is to say, we will be able to live longer and better.

In summary, physical exercise is medicine against cancer and, like any medicine, it must be prescribed and administered in the correct doses and by a qualified professional.

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
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




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Aging Skin: 4 Ways to Look as Good as You Feel

From Botox to microdermabrasion: Ways to erase wrinkles without surgery.


Drop off the dry cleaning, get the oil changed, have your wrinkles erased, pick up the kids up from soccer practice -- wait, whose to-do list is this? Cosmetic procedures don't all require general anesthesia, a nip, and a tuck. Some minor procedures can ease wrinkles in the doctor's office in less than an hour, and with little or no recovery time. Today, having cosmetic work done can be a lunch-hour errand.

Botulinum Toxin (Botox)

Botulinum toxin A, sold as Botox, is the purified toxin of the bacteria that causes botulism. Creepy, for sure, but it's also extremely effective as an anti-wrinkle treatment.

Tiny, over-clenched facial muscles are responsible for crow's feet, frown lines, and other facial wrinkles. Botulinum toxin is a paralyzing agent, which in tiny doses can relax these uptight muscles for months at a time.

Botox represents the ultimate in cosmetic convenience.



Injections of Botox usually take about ten to fifteen minutes in an office setting. The injections cause minimal discomfort for most people, with no recovery time. The flip side to this almost drive-through efficiency: the results are temporary. Treatments must be repeated every few months.

Chemical Peels

In a chemical peel, a chemical solution is applied to small areas of skin on the face, neck or hands. The chemicals damage the outer layers of skin in a controlled way. After the procedure, the damaged skin becomes red and peels off. Chemical peels can remove age spots, acne scars, and some wrinkles.

As the smoother skin underneath heals and grows, your skin looks younger.



Chemical peels come in a variety of strengths and types. Glycolic acid, trichloroacetic acid, salicyclic acid, lactic acid, or carbonic acids are used, sometimes in combinations. The application can take as little as 15 minutes. There may be mild redness and irritation afterwards, but most people return to normal activities immediately. It's important to wear sunscreen to protect your vulnerable skin after a chemical peel.

Laser Skin Resurfacing

"Regular" laser skin resurfacing uses a high-powered laser to damage outer layers of the skin with heat. Recovery can take weeks.

Newer "nonablative" lasers penetrate beneath the surface skin. This stimulates collagen production,



improving skin's tone and texture and minimizing fine lines. There is no damage to the outer skin, so there is no recovery time.

Each 15- to 30-minute procedure may cause some mild redness, which goes away quickly. A total of four to six treatments, spaced out over several weeks, provide the best results.

Microdermabrasion

Microdermabrasion involves a device that "sandblasts" the skin with a spray of abrasive microscopic crystals or different diamond HeadsScars from acne or chickenpox, wrinkles, and age spots can be reduced or removed with microdermabrasion.

Several treatments (up to 10 or so) may be needed for good results. Each treatment takes 30 minutes to an hour, repeated over weeks. Microdermabrasion has no side effects and no recovery time for most people. Full dermabrasion uses a rougher but more effective approach. In dermabrasion, a "skin sander" abrades skin more deeply. Seven to 10 days of recovery time are usually needed for skin to heal after dermabrasion.

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- 7. Changes in your mood and thinking. This may include feeling distant from other people and having overwhelming negative emotions. Sufferers often have highly developed inner and outer critics. The inner critic tells them negative comments about themselves: you are worthless, stupid, useless etc, while the outer critic does something similar about other people, judging them and making them in the wrong.
- 8. Self destructive behaviour, such as heavy use of drugs or alcohol, self harm or driving recklessly. These behaviours are often related to PTSD, as sufferers try to cope alone with the above symptoms. Or a PTSD sufferer may find themselves adopting certain strategies to avoid reminders of the past, including disassociation, social isolation, or avoidance of certain places or pastimes. They may also firmly lock away any memories of the past but this can lead to physical and mental health issues. The subconscious doesn't like unresolved issues and so it may present you with them when you least expect it, which can bring increased anxiety and fear.

COMPLEX PTSD

If trauma is continually repeated, for example in childhood abuse, continued service in areas of conflict or abusive relationships, then PTSD becomes Complex PTSD (CPTSD). You are more likely to experience CPTSD than



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PTSD if the trauma occurred at an early age or if it was inflicted by someone close to you or someone you continue to see on a regular basis.

People with CPTSD experience the above symptoms of PTSD but in addition they may also have difficulties in maintaining relationships, physical symptoms like headaches, chest and stomach pain and struggle to manage their emotions. They may also experience strong feelings of worthlessness.

Treatment for either condition usually takes time and it is best to involve a trained therapist. Both involve treatments for trauma that help to change thought patterns and unwanted behaviours and free sufferers from guilt and shame. CPTSD therapy may also involve learning coping strategies for managing strong emotions and creating healthy relationships. Antidepressants and anti-anxiety medications may also be prescribed but these help manage the symptoms without actually addressing the root cause.

If reading this article triggers negative emotions or feelings, or if you are experiencing some or all of the symptoms above please reach out for help as you do not have to suffer alone. UK figures from 2020 show 4 out of every 100 people suffer from PTSD and it is likely this figure has significantly increased.






