The Ukraine embassy in Madrid became the latest to receive a blood-soaked letter. Spanish police on Friday morning cordoned off the Ukrainian embassy in Madrid after workers there noticed a suspicious letter with traces of blood on the outside of the envelope, law enforcement sources have confirmed. The incident appears to be one of many taking place across Europe in recent days. Ukrainian Foreign Ministry spokesman Oleg Nikolenko on Friday said that some of its embassies and consulates in Europe have been receiving threatening letters and "bloody packages" containing "animal eyes." Ukrainian embassies in Hungary, the Netherlands, Poland, Croatia, Italy and Austria, as well as consulates in Naples, Krakow and Brno (Czech Republic) have received similar blood-soaked mail.

Missing People

Search for Levi Davis, the rugby player and 'X-Factor' star missing in Spain. His mother said that the 24-year-old said he was being blackmailed a few months before his disappearance in Barcelona. Police in the Spanish region of Catalonia have opened an investigation into the disappearance of Levi Davis, a British rugby player and former X-Factor contestant, who went missing in Barcelona on October 29.

The last photo of Levi Davis places him at 10pm at The Irish Pub in Barcelona's La Rambla neighbourhood. From there, he wrote a message to Squire and sent a video to his mother. "That day I didn't detect anything unusual, but he was having a bad time and was depressed," said Julie Davis. "He was saying he was being followed," she added. Security camera footage recorded him leaving the premises, and he was never heard from again.

Spain votes in favour of paid 'menstrual leave'

The Spanish Congress on Thursday voted through a bill granting paid medical leave to women who suffer from severe period pain, becoming the first European country to advance such legislation. Spain's coalition government between the PSOE socialists and left-wing Podemos party said the new legislation which passed its first reading by 190 votes in favour to 154 against and five abstentions was aimed at breaking a taboo on the subject.

Spain's new draft 'family law' bill to help working parents

The Spanish government has introduced a new draft 'family law' bill that aims to help working parents balance the tasks of raising children with their jobs. If passed, the new law will allow parents to have more paid time off work when family members get sick, or during the country's long summer holidays. If passed as it is by the Spanish Congress, the law would increase the right to paid leave from two to five days a year for any worker whose close relatives are ill or hospitalised. Originally seven days a year had been proposed, but the bill now stipulates five and which is the minimum allowed by the EU. However, the bill would now also grant the right for up to four days' paid leave a year for parents to deal with unforeseen emergencies regarding their families. Common-law couples will be afforded the same rights as married couples. The law also gives a new framework of recognition and protection for LGTBI families, or a family with a disability, as well as adoptive or foster families.

Spain's Guardia Civil bust 'Ukraine humanitarian aid' drug smuggling ring

Spain's Guardia Civil police have busted a drug smuggling ring that was transporting cannabis across Europe under the pretence of being a convoy of humanitarian aid destined for Ukraine. During the police operation, 30 suspects were arrested, among them Spaniards, Ukrainians, Germans and Moroccans at several locations across Andalusia. The marijuana, which came from plantations located across the region, was 'packaged in cardboard boxes disguised as supplies and humanitarian aid. They were then packed into vans registered in Ukraine that were 'purportedly acting as a solidarity convoy so they could pass under the radar of police and border controls', while visiting various European countries. A total of 8 raids were carried out. During the arrests, two of those being investigated tried to flee, hitting a police vehicle occupied by two agents, who suffered minor injuries. They were finally arrested, and also charged with a crime against road safety and another with an attack against law enforcement officers.

October at least since records began in 1961. Rubén del Campo of AEMET has also said that if extrapolated data from historical reconstructions is taken into account, then October will have been Spain's warmest month for a full century. With many places surpassing 30C, AEMET said that every day of the month, except 1 October, had been warmer than usual at this time of year. After a summer marked by repeated heatwaves across much of the continent, Europe is experiencing exceptional temperatures as it heads into autumn - a sign of accelerating climate change. The hydroelectric power plant at the Mequinenza reservoir is one of the biggest across the Iberian peninsula and is located between Catalonia and the neighbouring region Aragon to the west. The planned shutdown will take place in mid-November due to reserves dipping below 23% of total capacity, the second-worst level ever recorded since the dam opened in 1966.

Pret A Manger' sandwich chain to open 70 shops in Spain and Portugal

British sandwich and coffee chain Pret A Manger is to expand into Spain and Portugal as part of a plan to double in size, it said on Tuesday. Pret, owned by investment group JAB and founder Sinclair Beecham, said a franchise partnership deal with Ibersol Group will see 70 Pret shops open in Spain and Portugal over the coming years. The Ibersol Group operates over 600 restaurants across Portugal, Spain and Angola. The company manages its own brands such as Pans & Company, Ribs, Santamaría or FrescCo, as well as licenses for Burger King, Pizza Hut, KFC and Taco Bell. The franchise agreement follows Pret's announcement last year that it would aim to double the size of the business within five years, including launching into five new markets by the end of 2023.

Spanish government to pay €150k to SMEs to test a four-day work week

The Spanish government is to pay €150,000 to small and medium-sized companies (SMEs) that take part in a trial to adopt a four-day working week without any reduction in their staff's salaries. A number of countries around the world have also tested the four-day working week, with encouraging results. The largest trial to date was carried out in the UK, where 86% of the 70 companies that took part were satisfied with the results and said that they would continue with a reduced week for employees. The Spanish Ministry of Industry and Commerce will pay €150,000 to SMEs who take part in a trial over a period of two years. The companies will have to reduce their staff's weekly work hours by at least 10% during the entire two year pilot scheme, yet without reducing salaries. The trial project is part of an agreement between the Spanish coalition government and the left-wing Más País group, and which guarantees their support for Prime Minister Pedro Sánchez's 2023 national budget.

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Spain coach Luis Enrique quits

Luis Enrique has left his role as coach of Spain's national team after the country crashed out of the World Cup by losing on penalties to Morocco. The former Real Madrid and Barcelona player had been in the post since 2018. He will be succeeded by the manager of Spain's under-21 team, Luis de la Fuente. Spain's shock exit in Qatar followed a goalless draw in the last 16 match which saw the Spanish team struggle to break down a stubborn Moroccan defence, before a disastrous shootout in which they failed to score, going down 3-0.



Dozens try to flee after woman 'fakes labour' to get plane to make emergency landing in Spain

The flight made a medical emergency landing at Barcelona-El Prat Airport in Barcelona. Spanish police are searching for 12 people who fled a commercial plane after it made an emergency landing in Barcelona. At least 27 people initially left the aircraft after it landed without authorisation and "tried to flee," officials said. Thirteen were stopped by police and two more were detained later on Wednesday. Five of those detained agreed to re-board the flight, while the others were processed for illegal entry into Spain and are expected to be deported. The woman who was thought to be in labour has been detained on charges of public disorder after doctors determined that she was not about to give birth.

Morocco fans clash with police officers in Malaga's Fuengirola after World Cup match with Portugal

Following the World Cup victory over Portugal, Morocco football fans clashed with police officers in the streets of Fuengirola on the Costa del Sol. The trouble flared after Morocco fans took to the streets to celebrate their nation's historic win over Portugal in the 2022 Qatar World Cup. Around 1,000 people gathered in the town after the football match ended. Roads were subsequently blocked by vehicles displaying Moroccan flags and objects were reportedly thrown at National Police officers. As a result, two policemen were slightly injured. Damage was also caused to vehicles parked in the area.

Similar lively celebrations took place in other parts of Malaga province but there were no reported incidents. Many municipalities experienced a heavy flow of vehicles with people waving Moroccan flags.



Small tornado hits the Costa del Sol resort of Marbella

A small tornado hit the Costa del Sol resort of Marbella, tearing up trees, damaging vehicles, and breaking street furniture. As reported by AEMET, the State Meteorological Agency, a small tornado crossed the Costa del Sol city of Marbella on Monday, December 5th. It only last for a few minutes but that was long enough for it to bring down several trees in the centre of the municipality. Furniture belonging to catering establishments was also damaged as the atmospheric phenomenon twisted its way through the city. Several vehicles parked in the streets were also damaged as a result.

Thieves used explosives to break into Cajamar bank branch ATM machine in Malaga

Thieves using explosives almost destroyed the El Palo branch of Cajamar bank in Malaga. They detonated them in order to break into the facility's ATM machine. It is not known how much money the criminals escaped with. The premises was littered with broken glass, remains of furniture, computers, bricks, and metal structures lying everywhere.

The incident occurred just after 2am at the bank located at 184 Avenida Juan Sebastian Elcano, in front of the church of Las Angustias. The 112 Andalucia Emergency service received several calls from neighbours informing the operators of the loud explosion that had taken place. Patrols from the National and Local Police were immediately deployed to the location.

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Dupes and Duplicity

The true story of the 18th century's greatest femme fatale, and the most unfortunate of her victims.

On March 7, 1775, a handsome young apothecary named Robert Perreau entered a London bank with a simple, if somewhat extravagant request. He wanted to take out a £5,000 loan (equivalent to just under \$1 million today) from the bank's owners, the Drummond brothers. As collateral for the loan, Perreau offered a bond for £7,500 signed by the wealthy and respectable William Adair—in other words, if Perreau didn't pay back the £5,000 on schedule, Mr. Adair would cover the bank's loss, plus a 50 percent profit.

Though the effective interest rate Perreau offered was unusually high, withdrawing cash using someone else's cash as collateral was an otherwise common way of securing credit in the 18th century. Similar to co-signing agreements today, it was a system based on personal reputation, and a relatively safe bet for lenders, if not for the rich guarantors whose friends might abuse their trust. The only way it could go wrong for the bank was if the bond itself—that is, the wealthy person's promise to cover the loan—was forged. In this case, Robert Perreau was a successful businessman with plenty of assets, and Adair was known to have signed bonds for the Perreau family in the past. The Drummonds themselves had made previous loans to Perreau for other forms of collateral. By all appearances, it should have been a straightforward and safe investment for the Drummonds, especially considering the temptingly high payout.

But on this day, Henry Drummond had a gut feeling that something was wrong. He asked whether Perreau had personally seen Adair sign the bond. Perreau admitted that he hadn't, but insisted there could be no question of its authenticity: Adair's lawyer and his personal servant had both witnessed the bond, he pointed out, placing their own unique signatures just under Adair's. But the other Drummond brother—coincidentally also named Robert—was equally insistent. He knew Adair personally, and this was not his handwriting. Seemingly unruffled, Robert Perreau took back the bond and promised to sort out the matter with Adair. Instead, the Drummonds asked to keep the bond overnight and render a decision in the morning. Perreau readily agreed. Upon his return the next morning, the Drummonds reiterated their misgivings, and suggested that the three of them should go visit Mr. Adair together. Again, Robert Perreau seemed happy to comply. His attitude changed dramatically, however, once they arrived at the estate, where Adair confirmed what the Drummonds had suspected: the signature was not his, nor had he ever met Robert Perreau in his life. "Surely, sir, you are jocular!" cried Robert. "It is no time to be jocular when a man's life is at stake," replied Henry Drummond gravely. Indeed, the banking industry was still wobbling on foal's legs in the 18th century, and forgery was considered a particularly heinous crime against the public trust: two-thirds of those convicted were sentenced to execution, a rate second only to murder. "Well, then, I have been sent on a fine errand!" Robert declared. He told the men they should locate his sister-in-law, Caroline, who happened to be married to his identical twin brother, Daniel. She could explain everything. Despite his winding and patently unbelievable tale, this last part turned out to be true. Robert did, in fact, have a twin brother, so close in appearance that even friends had trouble distinguishing them. What's more,

Daniel's wife Caroline was not at all shocked to be summoned to the Adair estate by the local constable. Standing before the group of angry men, she seemed completely at ease and in control of the situation. First. she asked to speak to Robert Perreau alone , but the Drummonds refused. THE IMPORTANCE OF THE TAX FORM 210

(ANNUAL DEEM INCOME TAX) FOR **NON-RESIDENT PROPERTY OWNERS**

The Tax Returns that all Non-Resident Property owners should be submitting annually is called, Modelo 210, and the period for submitting this declaration is the calendar year, (i.e. 1st January to 31st December each year). The Annual Deem Income Tax due for the tax year 2021, must be paid before the 31st December 2022.

Many NON-RESIDENT PROPERTY OWNERS have not paid these annual taxes, not because they wish to commit tax fraud, but due to mere ignorance of the existence of this tax. Usually because nobody has ever informed them.

Everyone should be aware that ignorance of the Law is not an excuse for not paying this tax, so we recommend any NON-RESIDENT who owns a real estate property in Spain seeks tax advice to make sure they know what their tax obligations in Spain are. The tax form 210 is operated on a self-assessed system. This means that Non-residents have the obligation to prepare, calculate and pay their own Deem Income Tax every year.

Nowadays, the Inland Revenue computers can easily check who is not paying these taxes, so it is important to ensure that the annual tax form 210 is paid and submitted on time every year.

As this is not an easy process, we recommend that non-resident property owners should get professional assistance to prepare these annual taxes.

If you are a NON-RESIDENT PROPERTY OWNER IN SPAIN, you still have plenty of time to comply with this Tax law. It's better to do it before the Inland Revenue contacts you.



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My garden in Spain...

On my seed planting front, pansies have germinated fast along with armeria maritima, the sea pinks and the bells perennis daisies. Just before the rains, I moved the jacaranda tree to its new location. Since then it has grown nearly six inches and put up another shoot! Along with battling to grow roses in England, I managed to grow a few sweet peas. I usually grew them in a large pot with a 'wigwam' of canes for them to climb. So with this wonderful sunshine, I shall do a winter planting of sweet peas, which gives them a good start, so the books say. In Bristol, England, where we used to live, our local green grocers sold a lot of local produce, incredible vegetables, fabulous fruits and old fashioned flowers all lovingly grown by gardeners, young and old. The variety was incredible. Amongst the bunches of flowers that appeared from early spring were Sweet Peas, with a scent that you could smell a mile off and colour so intense that you could see them way off as well.





These beauties were grown by a partially sighted pensioner of nearly ninety years old, with the help of his daughter.

The varieties were from a Victorian collection, put together by the stockists, 'Plants of Distinction'. I have sent for and received the seeds for these beautiful plants. Theor names are lovely, as well – 'Painted Lady', Mrs Collier, Powered Lady and Queen Alexandra', to name but a few. Sweet Peas require deep pots for rooting and not being able to find, as yet, the seed pots required here in Spain, I shall be using plastic fruit baskets.

These are the ones I bought peaches, nectarines and baby tomatoes in earlier this year. They measure 4 inches in depth and will hold six seeds in each. Last year, for my first attempt at growing

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Sweet Peas here in Spain, I also used the cardboard middle tubes of loo rolls when finished, an idea extended from Pîppa Greenwood. She used strips of 3cm rolled newspapers to make tubes. Each tube was filled with compost, moistened and one Sweet Pea seed pushed into the tube. The roots grew through the newspaper, making planting out easy. Each method worked

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If Robert Perreau was telling the truth—if he had, indeed, been taken for a rube by his conniving sister-in-law—then he would hardly have been the first. From a young age, Margaret Caroline Rudd had an almost supernatural ability to manipulate those around her, especially when it came to men. Her opinion of the opposite sex was no doubt cemented in her formative years, after she was expelled from boarding school at the tender age of 13 for so-called "illicit relations" with a staff member. Social mores of the time placed blame firmly upon the victim, at least if the victim were female, and local gossip could barely keep up with the flirtations and affairs that supposedly followed. At 17, Caroline ran off with an English soldier whose regiment was stationed near her small Irish hometown, but his commanding officer promptly sent her home again. Undeterred, continued courting military men-who offered both a secure income, and an escape from the drudgery of rural lifeuntil she won the heart of another young soldier named Valentine Rudd. Ten days after meeting, the two were married. Unfortunately, even a respectable soldier's salary was not enough to satisfy Caroline's apparent taste for luxury. Within a year, Rudd and his new wife were deeply in debt, and he was forced to send her to live with his parents in England while he continued his deployment. This gave young Caroline the opportunity to work on a new kind of charm: talking people out of their money. Rudd's family was well off, and before long she had convinced her in-laws to pay off all the couple's debts, and send her to London to await the day when Rudd could secure an officer's commission—which, she assured them, was right around the corner.

In reality, Rudd was underperforming in his job, and unsuited to military life in general. Instead, he surprised Caroline by retiring early so he could join her in London. Living on a halfpension had not been part of her plans, but it turned out the constant presence of her husband was an even bigger irritation. Before long, Caroline ran off with an upstairs neighbour by the name of Benjamin Read.

This was doubly unkind to Rudd, as along with any emotional

anguish he may have suffered, Caroline's betrayal left him in a delicate financial situation. Technically, divorce was legal in 18th-century Britain, but in practice dissolving a marriage was nearly impossible due to the high burden of proof and prohibitive cost. And without a divorce, a husband was assumed to be responsible for his wife no matter the state of their relationship. Thus, when Caroline and her new beau failed to pay the rent on their love nest, the landlord instead came after Rudd to clear their debt—and when Rudd couldn't pay, he was arrested and thrown in prison.

Like the institution of marriage, penal institutions of the time were also very different from their modern counterparts: conditions were squalid, disease was rampant, and jailers had no obligation to provide even basic necessities for their

Those who didn't bribe the guards for upgrades like bread, water, and blankets were likely to die before even a short sentence had been served, and those in debtor's prison were especially unlikely to have such funds.

Caroline fared only somewhat better than her destitute husband. The relationship with Read soon faltered, and she was forced to support herself through prostitution. Regardless of how she may have felt about this new mode of employment, historical evidence seems to indicate that she was an excellent practitioner. Caroline's status as an articulate, well-dressed, and putatively middle-class woman earned her an equally sophisticated clientele, and she charmed more than one "acquaintance" into vouching for her with local merchants. During this time she also began experimenting with forged promissory notes to extend her credit further, although her initial attempts were not always successful—as one merchant disdainfully pointed out to her, the handwriting of both the guarantor and the recipient was the same.

UNDERSTANDING CANINE COMMUNICATION Part 2

Content & Happy Dogs



When you see a happy dog you'll see a relaxed body position and posture. A happy and content dog will appear physically relaxed and soft. A happy dog's ears will be in a relaxed position. (This will differ depending on the dog's breed and natural ear position.)

A play bow, where a dog lowers their front end until elbows are on the ground, tail wagging, and butt in the air, is a good sign that a dog is happy and trying to initiate play with you or another animal.

Dogs who are playing with each other or with you will often display bouncy movements. If two (or more) dogs are playing together and exhibit loud growls, barks, or even mouthing, the dog's overall body language is soft and no one is getting hurt.

Dogs playing well together will be reading each other's body language closely. They'll also tend to switch between who is chasing and who is being chased. They will naturally take breaks before initiating play again.

When happy, the dog's ears will be relaxed, not pressed back against the head. For example, a retriever's relaxed floppy ears look different from a husky's relaxed prick ears; but overall, when understanding if a dog is comfortable, we are looking for a generally neutral position. When content and happy, a dog's tail, mouth, eyes, and ears will all appear to be relaxed. Happy dogs may be observing the world around them, but don't appear to be hyperfocused. Additionally, no part of their body will appear tense. Similarly, when a dog is feeling content, the relaxed dog will likely lean into you during petting.

What aggression looks like

Aggressive dog behaviour is a complicated topic with a variety of underlying causes. It is a sign of fear. Aggression is a natural fightor-flight act for dogs who feel they have no other alternative way to respond. It doesn't mean that they are bad or violent.

Aggressive behaviour is generally the result of a dog being put into a position that is overwhelming, scary,

or otherwise uncomfortable for them.

Additionally, there's no such thing as an aggressive breed. Individual breed traits may influence reactions — some breeds are naturally more driven to chase prey, guard livestock, herd, or be all around sociable with strangers — but no breed of dog is inherently aggressive.

Signs of aggression, or that aggressive behaviour could happen, are because the dog is agitated or uncomfortable. It stems from fear. Body language to be aware of includes:

- a high wagging tail accompanied by stiff movements
- · narrowed eyes
- hard stare
- · raised hackles
- weight shifted back

This can mean the dog is upset and likely to react aggressively if it isn't given a way out of the situation they find upsetting.



This is just the tip of the iceberg when it comes to learning about how dogs communicate. It's important to bear in mind that a dog's breed and physical structure will change the way they can use their body to communicate. For example, a pug has a tail that is naturally tightly coiled over the back when it is relaxed. Another breed like a beagle has a naturally lower tail set. A beagle would likely show he is feeling aroused and alert with a tail held high over the back.

One of the best ways to learn about body language is to work with a trainer such as myself who utilises positive reinforcement methods. A dog trainer will be able to help translate your dog's body language. I can help you to develop your own skills with understanding what your dog is trying to communicate through their posture and behaviour. I've spent many years working with lots of different breeds and I'm a Certified Canine Body Language Specialist so can help you to understand canine communication a bit better, and importantly; understand what your dog is trying to say to you. The Queen of the Curve, she outcurved Frank Gehr, a planet in its own orbit, larger than life and bold as brass, the Inventor of the 89 degrees, an architect with spectacular vision. Just a few remarks from fellow architects.

A woman born in Iraq, a major figure in architecture of the late 20th and early 21st centuries. Her major works include the London Aquatics Centre for the 2012 Olympics, Rome's MAXXI Museum, and the Guangzhou Opera House. Several of her buildings were still under construction at the time of her death, including the Al Wakrah Stadium in Qatar, a venue for the 2022 FIFA World Cup.

Hadid was showered by awards: the first woman to receive the Pritzker Architecture Prize. She received the UK's most prestigious architectural award, the Stirling Prize twice. She was made a Dame by Elizabeth II, and in 2016 she became the first woman to be individually awarded the Royal Gold Medal from the Royal Institute of British Architects. She is high on the lists of the most influential figures in the world.

We are going to have a look at her visionary abstract paintings, her stunning buildings and amazing furniture and fashion. We will travel through her life from her first designs that were never built, to the highlights in her career to those that were finished after her untimely death in 2016 and see if we agree with the epithets given to her.

Lecture date: January 24th 2023(18:00 CET) Losing Freedom: the tragic end of the Spanish Revolution in 1823

NB. This is the fourth Tuesday of the month.

Two centuries ago, on a beach in the Bay of Cadiz, Freedom was defeated by Absolutism. In 1823 the first Constitutional Government of Spain was overthrown by an International Coalition that included several European countries and was led by France. In a single battle, in the Andalusian town of Puerto Real (Cádiz), on August 31, 1823, the Spanish liberals would be defeated by the army sent by the International Coalition: after that, the first period of constitutional government in Spain would have an end. This battle took place in an island called "El Trocadero", and would give its name to one of the most famous squares in Paris, just as the Battle of Trafalgar would give its name to a famous square in London. We will approach the History of these events that occurred two hundred years ago and that are not an isolated event, but are part of the Liberal revolutionary processes in Europe, of the path of construction of Democracy in Europe during the 19th Century.



About Manuel Parodi

Manuel Parodi, historian and archaeologist, has been working on the History of Archaeology in Northern Morocco and Southern Spain since 2005, and has published several books and articles regarding this particular matter. He has also been working in several Archaeological and Historical Research Projects in Morocco since 2005, including the Archaeological Museum of Tetouan, its Archives and historical documents and records.

Manuel has talked to us several times: in November 2016 about The Spanish Indiana Jones in North Africa 1900-1948, in October 2019 about Gadir/Cádiz and in November 2020 about the Magellan-Elcano circumnavigation of the world. His most recent talk was in March 2022 when he discussed Vikings in Al Andaluz.

Christmas, New Year, and the Holidays in general, are a difficult time for many people, especially those struggling with a drinking problem. Alcohol is everywhere; boozy office parties, family get-togethers or drinks out with friends and colleagues.

It is also a time where it is normal for people to overindulge. Which makes it easy to put off thinking about whether your alcohol use is out of control. Everyone is doing it; so that means it is okay – right?

But what happens now? The season is over, and you are struggling to stop with the daily/ morning/binge/excessive/....... (You can fill in the blank with any type of drinking that is causing an issue or a concern). Maybe your alcohol use over the festive period caused problems? There were arguments, accidents, missed events, or unnecessary drama. Was it simply that your compulsion to drink came before everything else? Leaving you isolated, miserable, and lonely.

Do you find yourself drinking when you don't really want to; on days when you have previously promised yourself that you wouldn't? If once you start, do you find you can't seem to stop? Is alcohol causing you, or those around you, a problem?

If you answer yes to any of these questions but find you can't seem to stop yourself from picking up that glass; or stay away from the booze for any length of time, then you are not alone. Alcoholics Anonymous (AA) can help. Here two members of AA talk about how they found an answer to their struggles with alcohol; and how they no longer feel alone.

"My name is Richard, I started drinking at 15 years old. The sensation was amazing, I loved the feeling, was immediately hooked, and wanted more. My drinking turned into a chronic problem when I retired from work. Alcohol became my life. I was depressed and lonely. I had no interest in people, places, or things. Relationships were a thing of the past. Eventually even eating became a chore – alcohol always came first.

After a serious health scare, which led to my hospitalisation, I knew I had to make a change or die. I was full of fear at the prospect of my first AA meeting. I hoped that I would hate it and that would justify never going back. However, what I found was love and understanding; and a realisation that there were many other people just like me." "My name is Donna. In the beginning alcohol gave me confidence, it was fun. Then it changed, instead of drinking to socialise and have a good time, I was drinking because I had to. I wasn't happy and alcohol numbed my feelings. Everyone around me drank, it wasn't unusual. But the way I was feeling, and using alcohol wasn't normal.

I didn't know what to expect at my first meeting. Sitting there listening, for the first time ever I felt I wasn't alone. I heard people speaking about how they felt and how they drank ... and it was just the way I did. It gave me hope. Life now is fantastic. I love sobriety, and the new life I have been given. I am no longer sad and self-obsessed. I can be useful to others. I like who I am. I hated myself when I was drinking. AA worked for me, when everything else I tried, had failed."

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Lamb Stew with Root Vegetables

Serves:-8

Ingredients:-

1/2 cup all-purpose flour

Salt and freshly ground pepper

4 pounds boneless lamb shoulder or top round, cut into 2inch cubes

- 1/2 cup olive oil
- 2 cups dry red wine
- 2 tablespoons sherry vinegar
- 4 cups chicken stock
- 2 tablespoons chopped tarragon
- 1 pound baby carrots, peeled
- 1 pound baby parsnips, peeled
- 1 pound small fingerling potatoes
- 1/2 pound baby turnips, halved
- 8 baby fennel bulbs, trimmed, fronds reserved and chopped





Lamb Stew with Root Vegetables

1 large shallot, minced 2 tablespoons minced parsley

Preparation:-

Preheat the oven to 350°. Put the flour in a large bowl and season generously with salt and pepper. Add the lamb cubes in 4 batches, tossing to coat thoroughly. In a large enameled cast-iron casserole, heat 2 tablespoons of the oil until shimmering. Add one-fourth of the lamb cubes and cook over moderately high heat until browned, about 6 minutes; transfer to a plate. Brown the remaining floured lamb in 3 batches, adding 2 tablespoons of oil to the pot per batch. Reduce the heat if the casserole bottom darkens too much.

Return all of the lamb to the casserole. Add the wine and vinegar and bring to a boil. Add the stock and tarragon and return to a boil. Season with salt and pepper. Cover the casserole and braise the stew in the oven for about 1 hour, or until the meat is nearly tender.

Add the carrots, parsnips, potatoes, turnips, fennel and shallot to the lamb stew. Season with salt and pepper and bring to a boil, stirring to distribute the vegetables. Cover the casserole, return it to the oven and cook until the meat and vegetables are tender, about 1 hour longer. Season with salt and pepper. Stir in the parsley and fennel fronds and serve the stew in deep bowls.

Spicy Coconut Chicken Stew with Corn

Serves:- 4

Ingredients:-

- 2 tablespoons canola oil
- 3 shallots, thinly sliced
- 2 fresh Thai chiles, thinly sliced

One 15-ounce can unsweetened coconut milk

1/2 cup chicken stock or low-sodium broth

1/4 cup fresh lime

juice

Kosher salt

Pepper

1 pound shredded rotisserie chicken (4 cups)

1 1/2 cups fresh corn kernels (from 2 to 3 ears)

3 cups spinach leaves

1 cup basil leaves, plus more for serving



Spicy Coconut Chicken Stew with Corn

Preparation:-

In a large, deep skillet, heat the oil. Add the shallots and chiles and cook over moderate heat, stirring occasionally, until tender, about 5 minutes. Add the coconut milk, stock and lime juice and bring just to a simmer. Season the broth generously with salt and pepper. Stir in the chicken and corn and cook until hot, 3 to 5 minutes. Stir in the spinach and simmer until just wilted, then stir in the 1 cup of basil. Transfer to shallow bowls, garnish with basil and serve.



Chickpea Stew with Spinach and Chorizo

Chickpea Stew with Spinach and Chorizo

Serves:-8

Ingredients:-

2 cups dried chickpeas, soaked overnight and drained 1/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil

- 4 garlic cloves, minced
- 1 large onion, finely diced
- 1 1/2 teaspoons finely chopped rosemary
- 1 bay leaf

One 28-ounce can tomatoes, chopped, 1 cup juice reserved

1/2 pound soft cooked chorizo, sliced 1/4 inch thick 1 pound spinach, thick stems discarded Salt and freshly ground pepper

Preparation:-

In a medium saucepan, cover the chickpeas with 2 inches of water and bring to a boil. Reduce the heat to low and simmer until the chickpeas are tender, about 2 hours; add more water as necessary to maintain the level. Drain the chickpeas and reserve 1 cup of the cooking water. In a medium, enameled cast-iron casserole, heat the olive oil. Add the garlic, onion, rosemary and bay leaf and cook over moderate heat until the onion is softened, about 7 minutes. Add the tomatoes and cook over moderately high heat until sizzling, about 4 minutes. Add the chorizo, the cooked chickpeas and their reserved cooking water and the tomato juice and bring to a simmer. Stir in half of the spinach and cook until wilted, then stir in the remaining spinach. Simmer over moderately low heat for 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Season with salt and pepper.

Beef Rib Eye and Vegetable Stew

Serves:- 4

Ingredients:-

2 tablespoons vegetable oil

2 pounds boneless beef rib eye, trimmed of visible fat and cut into 1-inch chunks

Salt and freshly ground pepper

1 tablespoon unsalted butter

2 carrots, diced 2 garlic cloves, very coarsely chopped

1 large potato, diced 1 large onion, diced

1/4 cup all-purpose flour

1 cup dry red wine

2 cups beef stock

4 thyme sprigs, plus thyme leaves for garnish

1 bay leaf

1 cup frozen peas



Beef Rib Eye and Vegetable Stew

Preparation:-

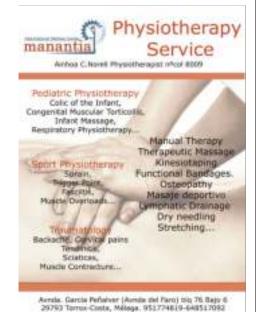
Heat a large skillet. Add the oil and heat until wisps of smoke appear. Add the meat, season generously with salt and pepper and brown on all sides over moderately high heat, about 4 minutes total. Using a slotted spoon, transfer the meat to a plate. Melt the butter in the skillet. Add the carrots, garlic, potato and onion and cook until lightly coloured, about 3 minutes. Stir in the flour. Add the red wine and simmer, scraping up any browned bits from the bottom of the pan. Add the stock, thyme sprigs and bay leaf and bring to a boil. Cover and simmer over moderately low heat until the carrots and potato are fork tender, about 6 minutes.

Add the peas and the meat along with any accumulated juices, cover and simmer until the meat is heated through and medium rare, about 3 minutes. Discard the bay leaf and thyme sprigs. Season with salt and pepper, garnish with thyme leaves and serve.

It is evident that putting everything that causes chronic pain in the same bag is very risky, because the differences and characteristics from one process to another can be very different, but in general we can say that, as a single or complementary treatment, acupuncture has been proving its effectiveness not only in reducing pain, but also in recovering joint function. It is important to underline the joint unblocking effect that acupuncture exerts, as it is a very relevant aspect in the prognosis of a process, especially when the pain has a joint, lesional or degenerative origin.

Advantages of acupuncture

In the first place and very important is the absence of unwanted or secondary effects and secondly it has a synergistic effect with most of the drugs used in the treatment of chronic pain, whereupon with the same pattern we can achieve more important effects regarding to the reduction of pain and functional limitation.

Action mechanisms

There is always a certain expectation that the implantation of filiform elements has beneficial effects on specific pathologies or symptoms, in the case at hand, on pain. It can be explained in two ways, from the energy point of view pain is classified as an "obstructive phenomenon" and therefore there are therapeutic strategies to eliminate the obstruction and therefore the pain. From the most westernized point of view, the points, zones or areas that are used for the treatment of pain are neurovascular zones. By applying stimuli to these places, a series of activities are stimulated that are mediated by the peripheral and central nervous system and basically improve the mechanisms of pain modulation. It also has an impact on the inflammatory process since it is capable of stimulating the vagal system, which in turn inhibits the production of cytokines that are essential in any inflammatory process.

Where to fit the Specialty

Acupuncture could be considered one more medical specialty. But it has a differential characteristic and it is its combinatorial and synergistic capacity. 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NICE Guidelines on Menopause Treatments

ANY FORM OF PAIN can be challenging for even the most astute physician. Neuropathic or nerve pain is particularly complicated to treat effectively for a variety of reasons, from a lack of an obvious source to the inability of the patients to describe their pain, to previous poor management with the wrong medications, allowing the pain to progress to a seemingly unmanageable state.

Neuropathic pain has many diverse etiologies, including infections, inflammation, trauma, metabolic abnormalities, chemotherapy, surgery, radiation, neurotoxins, nerve compression, and tumor infiltration. The presentation of neuropathic pain varies from patient to patient. 'Allodynia' is pain resulting from a normally non-painful stimulus (the touch of clothing or

An exaggerated pain response to a painful stimulus (a pinprick) is termed 'hyperalgesia'. Patients may also complain of 'hypoesthesia' or diminished sensations, 'paresthesia' or an abnormal sensation (e.g. crawling insects, walking on broken glass or fire), constant burning, sharp, shooting or stabbing electrical currents. Neuropathic pain can be symmetrical affecting the area of distribution of the nerves, or it can be asymmetrical and diffused. It may or may not be associated with other neurological symptoms such as numbness and weakness.

Currently, we don't have a 'gold standard' objective test to confirm the presence or absence of neuropathic pain. Diagnostic studies, including imaging and nerve conduction studies, do not correlate well to the severity of pain. This makes a carefully elicited description of neuropathic pain symptoms from the patient and a detailed clinical assessment critical to make a good diagnosis, understand the underlying mechanism, and determine the most appropriate and effective approach for managing neuropathic pain.

Many people with neuropathic pain are often given

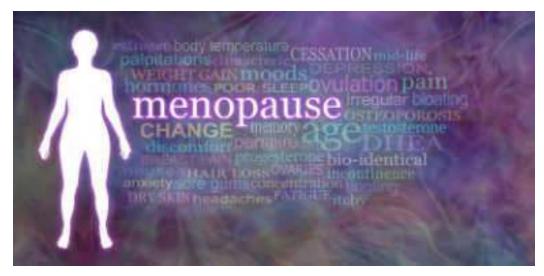

escalating doses of opioids in an attempt to control their discomfort; it is not until much later that they are sent to pain management specialists. Opioids are rarely a good choice for the sole treatment of neuropathic pain. Neuropathic pain medications, which include certain antidepressants and antiepileptics (indicated for specific types of neuropathic pain), are rarely discussed with these patients in the early stages, and, unfortunately, are often first mentioned late in the disease's pregression. Moreover, when I start suggesting these medications for the treatment of neuropathic pain some patients give me a doubting look with a few saying – 'I'm not crazy, I need a higher dose of meds... my pain is off the scale!' or 'I'm in pain not depressed.' Controlling this neuropathic pain is an uphill battle for both patients and physicians alike. Whereas nocioceptive pain can usually be pinpointed to an actual event (pain from a broken bone), neuropathic pain is vague and nondescript in nature. For many physicians, there is no sense of need to pull out the details from the ambiguity; a opioid pain killer prescription is given and the patient is out of the surgery. Except the discomfort most likely continues, with the patient now at risk for drua dependency, a whole



new problem. The following therapies for chronic pain can help enhance the quality of life and the ability to function for people living with neuropathic pain.

Pharmacological therapies – e.g., nonsteroidal snit- imflammatory drugs (NSAIDs), analgesics, tricyclic anti depressants, selective serotonin and norepinephrine re-uptake inhibitors (SSNRI), anticonvulsants, opioids. Topical therapies – e.g., lidocaine patch, capsaicin patch.

Interventional therapies – e.g., nerve blocks, trigger point injections. Advanced pain therapies – e.g., neurolytic procedures (e.g., destruction of the offending nerve), neuroaugmentation techniques (e.g., spinal cord stimulators), intrathecal drug delivery systems. Rehabilitative therapies – e.g., physical therapy, occupational therapy.

Psychological therapy – e.g., Complementary therapies – e.g., exercise, dietary supplements.

Menopause and osteoporosis

The menopause with women starts when the oestrogen levels drop. The oestrogen levels drop with age and this is a normal cycle of life starting usually between 45 and 55 years of age. It all starts with hot flashes, changes in the monthly period, gaining or losing weight, anxiety, depression, insomnia, difficulty concentrating, mood swings etc.. Some women have severe symptoms, other very few and mild ones. But disregarding the intensity, every woman feels that her body

changes. Even if you have very few problems, it does not mean you can't get osteoporosis.

Osteoporosis is a dangerous side effect of the menopause. You can prevent it by exercising (especially weight baring, resistance and balance exercises!). Taking supplements such as vitamins and minerals also helps prevent osteoporosis. Osteoporosis is a serious disease. Don't underestimate it. It can be painful. It often leads to hunched posture and will limit your mobility. Go see your doctor, take the supplements and exercise.

Sports is a good medication. It soothes the symptoms and makes you feel good about yourself. You know you have overcome the most difficult stage of the menopause when you feel good again like you did before.

And how about men?

Older men don't get in a menopause but can get osteoporosis! So men over 40 should also exercise and take supplements. Exercise not only makes your heart, muscles and bones stronger but it also makes you lose weight and this will be beneficial to the bones also. So choose a sport that is weight baring like strength training in a gym or a Bootcamp or BodyPump class. Or working out using your own weight like in a Pilates class. Take on something you really like. And one with as little obstacles as possible: Close to home, normal prices, flexible hours and no contracts. Keep moving! Venga vamos!

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Use pineapple fresh or frozen.

Lemon: Low in sugar and full of nutrients, lemons are detox divas. Lemons are amped up with antioxidant vitamin C, antibiotic phytonutrients, and B vitamins. The citric acid in lemons aids digestion while ascorbic acid fights free radicals.

Lemon peels are particularly rich in antioxidants, so throw some zest into your shakes for an additional "booster" of nutrition and flavour.

Cayenne Pepper: I seize every opportunity to add a pinch of cayenne to smoothies. It adds crazy-amazing flavour and healing potential. As one of the most powerful detox foods, cayenne heats the body to sweat out toxins. Naturally antibiotic and anti-fungal, cayenne is also a powerful immune booster.

Broccoli: Broccoli is one of the richest sources of glucosinolates – some of the most powerful toxin tackling compounds found in foods. Armed with an arsenal of antioxidants, minerals, flavonoids, carotenoids, omega-3s, and fibre, these fierce florets combat inflammation, oxygenate the blood, and banish bad bacteria for better digestion.

Basic requirements to make a smoothie

Choose a base liquid: You can use 1 to 2 cups of filtered water, raw coconut water, unsweetened almond milk or hemp milk, fresh apple or orange juice, herbal tea, green tea, unsweetened kefir or kombucha. Choose your base ingredients: Add 2 cups of fresh or frozen fruits or veggies, like apple, orange, kiwi, melon, berries, beets, cucumber, pineapple, mango, or peaches.

Add some creaminess: Banana, avocado, coconut meat, unsweetened natural yogurts, blanched almonds, or almond butter all add richness and creaminess to smoothies.

Add some greens: Next add 1 to 2 cups of spinach, romaine or radish greens; 1 cup kale, bok choy, chard, collards, beet greens; or 1/4 cup arugula or dandelion greens.

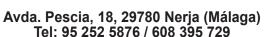

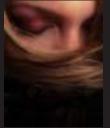


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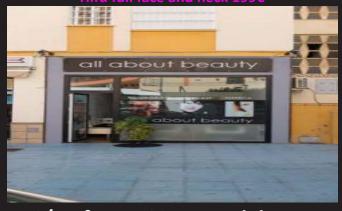

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Cancer - being able to take control.



The words 'you have cancer' are life changing. You go numb; feel disbelief, fear, anger, confusion and a multitude of other emotions. The world tilts and will never be quite the same again. I heard those words myself a few months ago and have started on a whole new journey. I'm lucky that I'm a therapist, have many friends in the healing profession and also friends who have walked this road before me. I'm learning so many things and I thought I could share some of them in the hope it may help others who have received a similar diagnosis. It's important to remember that everyone's experience of cancer is different. everyone's reaction is different and everyone's treatment is different. There is no 'one size fits all' and there are choices and decisions to make that are personal to each individual. Treatments include conventional medicine and alternative therapies or, as in my case, a decision to use both together. So apart from the conventional treatments like surgery, chemotherapy, radiotherapy and immunotherapy, what else may be helpful to us and our bodies. This brief overview (part 2 next month) will hopefully raise questions and awareness and enable you to find your own healing path.

A positive attitude

One of the first things that surprised me was how many people told me their own cancer story. There are many, many cancer survivors out there and they all stress the importance of a positive attitude. Now that's not to say you won't have your days when you're scared, sad or feeling alone. I've had my share of those but I'm keeping my main focus on being positive about the journey and the outcome. So try to give yourself future goals, things to look forward to while also appreciating the good things in your life in the present moment. In the first few weeks after diagnosis, it was like the world was lit up in technicolour. I became so appreciative of every colour, sound, smell and touch. I have daily gratitude for the life I've lived, the life I'm living and the life I will live in the future. The doctors here have been so kind and supportive, as have my friends and family. For those of you supporting someone with cancer, just know that your doing so makes a huge difference. Also I've found that in between the anxious moments there have been moments of humour, with both the ridiculous and the



absurd. Sometimes parts of the treatment can make you laugh (yes really) and as Daniel Prokop said. 'in the midst of tragedy, we are in laughter, sometimes farce.'

Diet

This is a big thing. There are many different opinions out there but most agree that a plant based diet is healthier. But your dietary changes are not just during treatment, they should really be a forever lifestyle change to reduce the risk of the cancer returning. So your new way of eating needs to be one that you are comfortable with and can maintain. If you do eat meat (and protein is important during chemotherapy to support healthy cells), it is best to avoid processed meats (sausages, salamis, bacon and ham) and red meat (beef, lamb, pork and venison). In fact processed foods in general are best steered clear of. Also sugar, sugary drinks and snacks (and carbohydrates because they turn into sugar) are best avoided as they 'feed' the cancer cells. Jane McLelland's book How to Starve Cancer, tells of her own journey and how she discovered what foods and supplements work to combat different cancer types. The bottom line is there are foods like broccoli and kale that will help and others like fried foods and alcohol that will hinder. Also during treatment it's best to avoid raw fish, soft cooked eggs, mayonnaise and unpasteurised dairy products as they carry the risk of food bourne illnesses. Try to eat healthy fats like avocados, walnuts and olive oil and healthy carbs such as whole wheat, bran and oats. Each person needs to find their own diet that works for them. Speak to a nutritionist and experiment. I followed a vegan diet when I was first diagnosed and I felt amazing. Now as I start pelvic radiation my doctors have put me on a completely different diet which is easy on the colon, with very low fibre (few vegetables and no pulses) and lots of animal protein. If, like me, you choose to combine both complementary and conventional treatments you may find yourself adopting both options as and when needed and that's fine. It's your journey. You do what you are comfortable with. As soon as my treatment is over, I will return to a plant based diet.

Supplements

Again there are many out there. Be careful to choose supplements (preferably organic) that can work together and always check with your medical team if you want to continue using them during chemo or radiotherapy. Some supplements, and indeed foods such as grapefruit, can inhibit the efficacy of certain drugs. Cancers and their treatment often causes a decrease in appetite, or digestive issues such as constipation or diarrhoea. You may need to take a multivitamin or Vitamin D, which helps to keep your immune system strong and reduces fatigue. Alternative supplements such as turkey tail mushrooms, spirulina, melatonin and curcumin to name but a few, are worth investigating for their ability to inhibit tumour growth. Some are more beneficial for certain types of cancer and some help enhance conventional therapy treatments.

Cleaning and beauty products.

Nowadays, we are in contact with so many different chemicals and it may be that you prefer to limit those that are entering the body, either through the skin or the lungs. Personally, I feel the less chemicals I am in contact with, the better chance my body has to fight the cancer. I have changed my beauty products to natural ones without parabens, silicones and other chemicals. I try to clean with more natural products including vinegar and bicarbonate of soda. Chemicals in cigarettes, hair dyes and flame retardants are just some that can cause cell mutations.

Control

It's very easy to feel a loss of control in your own life when you are treating cancer. You are sent for this procedure and that treatment and your body is producing cells that you have been unaware of and appear to have no control over. But it's important to remember that you can take control. You can choose your methods of treatment, you can choose what you are putting in your body from both a dietary perspective and your access to chemicals in the air and on your skin. You can do so much to improve your immune system and to keep your spirits up. The important thing to remember is that you are not alone. Allow others to help and support you. You can do this!

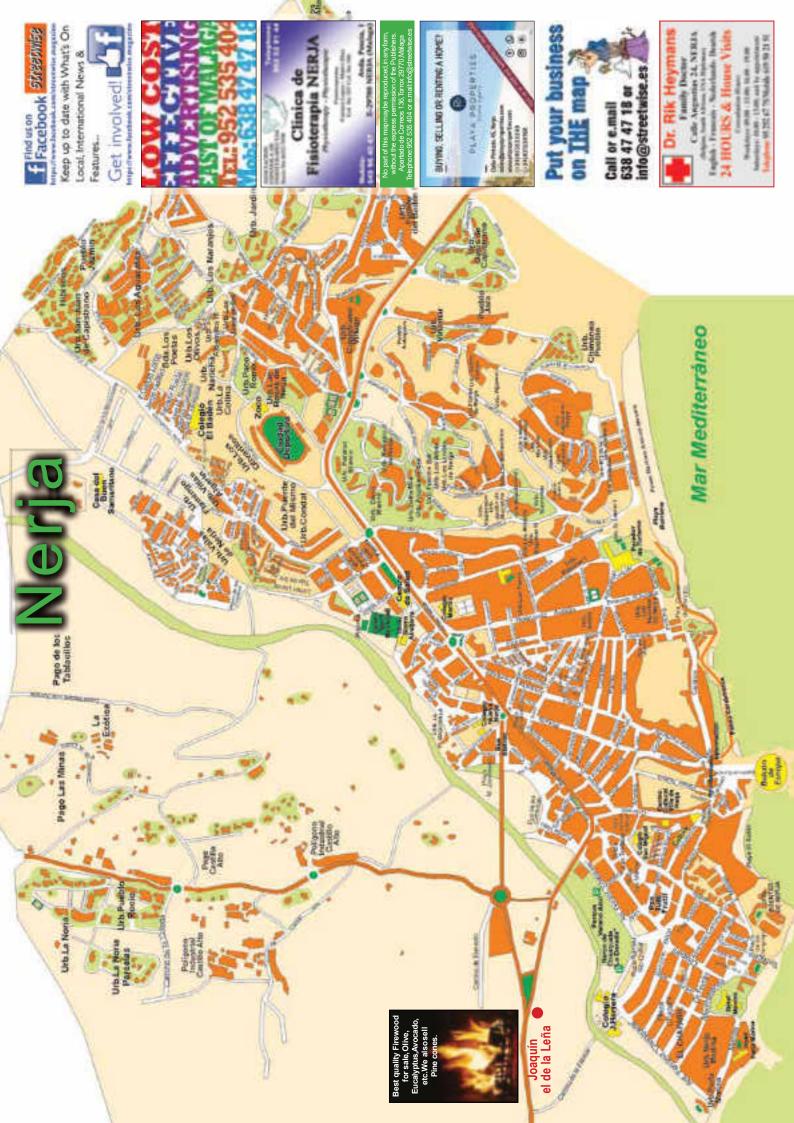

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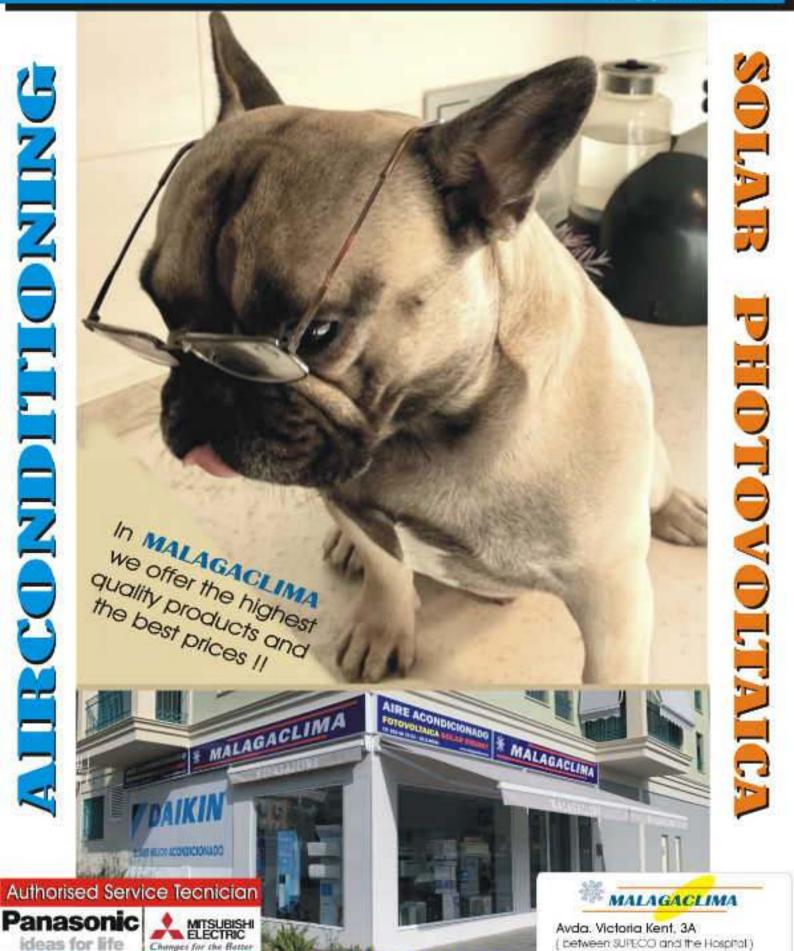

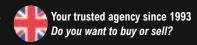








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
