Málaga requests a one-year moratorium to install its low emissions zone

Malaga city that is governed by the PP, have asked the Government for a one year extension to install the low emissions zone (ZBE) in the city. There are 151 municipalities throughout the country who are obliged to install a low emissions zone. Malaga have already postponed until January 1st 2024 but have also requested a postponement of one more year.

At the moment only 14 municipalities have already fully implemented the low emission zones, while another 15 have not even begun their procedures, according to data presented by the Secretary of State for the Environment, Hugo Morán.

Low emissions zones are one of the measures included in the Climate Change Law that seek to improve air quality in larger cities. They do this by restricting the access of the most polluting vehicles.

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Spain becomes world favourite of egg freezing

More and more women, including many Americans, are travelling to Spain to undergo a procedure known as oocyte vitrification due to the high cost of doing so in their own country.

According to the latest data from the Spanish Ministry of Health, of the 127,420 cycles carried out during 2020, 12,171 were for foreign patients. (INE). In the case of vitrification, the expense can be even higher, as the procedure is relatively simple and not particularly painful, and therefore easier to integrate into a vacation. Oocyte vitrification is "an ultra-rapid freezing of eggs in their earliest phase," explains Sara López, a gynecologist and author of books on the subject. In the last decade, the number of women who froze their eggs increased by 142% in Spain, going from 129 cases in 2010 to 5,480 in 2020, according to the most recent data from the Spanish Fertility Society (SEF). The number is now believed to be much higher, as there is some delay in data collection.

Cow Covid threatening livestock ranches

Epizootic Hemorrhagic Disease (EHD) has killed hundreds of cattle in Europe after being detected in November 2022. Farmers and experts compare EHD to Covid 19 due to its multifaceted impact on ruminants and the difficulty of preventing contagion. Spain's Ministry of Agriculture and Livestock and regional government officials issued warnings about this risk after dozens of outbreaks and animal deaths were reported. To prevent the spread of EHD, animals and vehicles must be disinfected before they can move from affected areas to EHD-free areas.

Oldest Roman forum found in Zaragoza

Experts believe that the square, 'of monumental dimensions,' was part of an unknown city razed to the ground in 70 B.C. during the Sertorian civil war.

Following the end of pandemic restrictions, there is a rise in Americans returning to Spain

In the middle of Spains high tourtist season, and with Spain's summer figures not yet back to pre-pandemic levels, the U.S. market is surging. During summer 2023 there was 17.4% more American visitors than in the same period during 2022, when coronavirus restrictions were still in place, according to data from the National Statistics Institute (INE).

America stands at the 6th position behind others such as the United Kingdom, France and Germany.

Successful police team solving many organised crime cases

A special unit created in 2019 to investigate drug wars in towns along the country's southern coast, particularly Marbella, have arrested 50 people and solved 18 cases.

Man arrested in Nerja

A foreign man has been arrested in connection with an investigation following the violent death of a German individual inside a Maro cave near Nerja. Guardia Civil officers from Nerja arrested a middle-aged man for the alleged fatal attack which took place during September. Several witnesses alerted authorities after they found the body with severe head injuries. Police then detaineed a man, who had been living inside one of the numerous inhabited caves in the area for several months.

More than 300 people have drowned at beaches or in swimming pools in Spain during 2023

Five people drowned during August 2023 in the Andalucía region taking the toll to 43, the figure is less than 2022. There have been 43 drownings this year, compared to the 45 recorded during the same period last year, according to the Royal Spanish Federation of Rescue and Lifesaving. Andalucía is the second-placed region in Spain with the most drownings this year, behind Catalonia which recorded 49 deaths.

Malaga to clamp down on stag and hen parties behaviour

With fines of up to 750 euros, local Police will soon be able to charge people with the offences of nudity and carrying inflatable sex dolls or items of a sexual nature in the streets. Malaga City Hall has taken a decisive step to put an end to the lewd behaviour surrounding the growing number of stag and hen parties that are held in the city centre.



El Caminito del Rey gorge winter season tickets on sale

Tickets for one of the most popular tourist attractions in the Malaga province can now be purchased online from Wednesday 20th September, the winter season ticket dates are from the 7th November 2023 to 31st March 2024. From November, visitors will be able to enjoy this natural site from Tuesday to Sunday, with opening hours from 8am to 5pm, except on public holidays such as Christmas, Semana Blanca, Easter Week and Mondays 26th February and 25th March 2024. Ticket prices remain unchanged at €10 for general admission and €18 for guided tours.

New animal welfare law is delayed

The legal obligation for civil liability cover will not come into force on 29th September, as originally planned. Although that was the date set when it was due to enter into force, the political situation in Spain has forced a change. The Directorate General for Animal Rights, which is part of the Ministry of Social Rights and Agenda 2023, has issued a circular stating that the compulsory civil liability insurance for pet dogs will be postponed until a regulation is approved to develop the law. This insurance policy will cover damage that canines can cause to third parties, whether to property, another animal or a person. Once implemented, it will have to be complied with by the owners of more than nine million pet dogs estimated to exist in Spain, according to the Afaac association.



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

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My garden in Spain...



Agapanthus

June – Late

The tomato plants came good eventually and we have been enjoying lots of their sweet little fruits. A new addition to the herb garden this year was a mint that smells of chocolate as well when you rub the leaves. It really does smell like an 'after eight mint'. Last year the lovely Stephanotis succumbed to red spider mite and despite some medicine and a wash in the shower, it sort of 'folded' itself up and sulked. Can't blame it really! I trimmed the shoots and relegated it to a sheltered place in our garden, as I didn't have the heart to throw it away. It got watered along with the shrubs around it, but I didn't pay it much attention, until the other day. It must have 'forgiven' me for the medicine and the shower, as it was one mass of blooms, with not a bug in sight.

On the subject of bugs, a friend had his beloved, new mimosa tree partially eaten by a swarm of insects that alighted early in the morning and munched away. Not long after some similar hungry pests came to my garden made short work of a rose bush, a new hibiscus and some nasturtiums! There has been a load more bugs this year and a lot of plants have suffered. I have been told that not having a proper spring this year may have something to do with it.

July – early

The Agapanthus plants have put up long stems and their flower heads, known as umbels, are almost ready to open. This is another plant native to South Africa that has travelled well. It is a very elegant plant; the name is derived from the Greek agape, meaning love, and Anthos, flower. I first saw this plant in the garden of an architect. He had not had a garden before but had very definite ideas on what he liked once he got started. What resulted was not a flower garden in the usual sense. His garden was a beautiful design of raised beds, mosaic paths and what is best described as 'plant sculptures' in a wonderful array of pots. These 'plant sculptures' were in fact a wonderful selection of alliums on huge stems with flower heads in a wide array of size, colour and shape. To compliment them, there were grasses, a contorted dwarf bamboo a succulents that were small and rounded or tall and spiky. It was fascinating and apparently very easy to look after. The owner was away a lot with his job and any hot, dry spells in his absence didn't cause too much of a problem. Whilst I was there, I admired a deep plum coloured

succulent with rosettes of different sizes up its stem. I was given a rosette to propagate, but my garden and house in England was too cold and it rotted away. So I was very pleased to find one in a viveros out here. It was called Aeonium Zwartkop and it looks really good against a white wall, where mine is now growing. It has reached a height of about 18 inches since I planted it in early spring. It really is unusual.

I brought with me from England a catalogue by Jaques Amand who specialise in unusual flowering bulbs, alliums amongst them. The variety in colour, height and flowering time of these unusual plants is incredible. The added bonus is that many of the taller specie are excellent as cut or dried flowers.

I took great pleasure in seeing the photographs of my two cats in Streetwise, June edition. They had sort of grown up with my garden and always found something to investigate, stalk or just watch every day. Sadly, Minou, the lady cat, succumbed to viral leukaemia a few weeks ago. There is no cure for this disease, the vet told us and she was put to sleep.

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

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The Importance of Play for your Dog

When it comes to keeping your dog active and healthy, what comes to mind? If you're like most dog owners, you may think of walking your dog, providing them with the best diet, and taking them to the vet. Yes, all of these are vital for your dog's health. 



Inflation update and planning ahead to protect our savings

It has been two years since inflation began to climb and we were soon noticing the higher cost of living. Prices continued rising over the following year, peaking last autumn across much of Europe. We have seen improvement since then, with the Spanish consumer price index returning to normal levels in June. However, it has been inching up again since then.

EU and Spain inflation

Across the Eurozone, inflation peaked at 10.6% last October and has since fallen to 5.3% in July and August.

Prices have been largely driven, both up then down, by energy costs. Energy inflation hit a record 44.3% high in 2022. Food prices were also significantly impacted by global events, reaching a historic high of 15.5% this March.

The European Central Bank expects inflation to continue to slow. After 2022's 8.4% inflation, the bank forecasts it will be to 5.4% this year, 3% next year then 2.2% in 2025.

These are average rates for the Euro area and inflation levels vary across the member countries.

Spain's Consumer Price Index (CPI) returned close to the 2% target in June, falling to 1.9%. However, it is back on an upward path, to 2.3% in July and 2.6% in August thanks to fuel prices being higher than a year ago. Electricity though is lower than in August 2022. Food inflation remains high at 10.5%.

Unless they are negative, falling inflation rates do not mean that

prices are falling, it just means they are rising less slowly than they were 12 months previously. The cost of living remains higher than it did back when all this started in 2021.

UK inflation

The UK endured persistently high inflation for longer, but in June the Consumer Price Index resumed a downward path and finally fell below 8%. There was a sharper drop in July with a 6.8% annual rate of change (August data is not available at the time of writing). Food inflation remained stubbornly high at 14.9% in July.

This is the lowest inflation recorded since March 2022, though still far above the 2% target.

The Bank of England expects inflation to fall markedly over the rest of 2023, to around 5% by the end of the year and to meet the 2% target by early 2025.

Inflation and your savings and retirement income

We will all breathe a sigh of relief when inflation, including food inflation, returns to normal levels, but should not become

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complacent about the inflation risk and how the rising cost of living affects us over time, particularly once we're retired.

Low inflation is insidious. It seems harmless at the time, but slowly but surely, compounded over the longer-term, it erodes the spending power of your savings and income.

As a basic illustration, if you have €50,000 in a current account with no growth, and inflation is 3% every year, after 10 years its value will have fallen to around €37,000. After 20 years it's around €27,500 and after 30 just €20,555. That's a 59% reduction in purchasing power.

If you're retiring now at age 60, you need to plan for over 30 years of retirement. Unless your savings grow each year, they will buy you considerably less as the years go by. We need to protect our savings and future income from the rising cost of living – making sure our money lasts as long as we do should be an integral part of our financial planning for retirement.

You need to invest in assets that are usually expected to produce enough growth to keep up with inflation over the medium to long term. Although bank interest rates have risen in response to inflation, we know how easy it is to earn negative real (inflation adjusted) rates of return from banks.

While you may become more averse to investment risk in retirement, remember that inflation is also a big risk to your savings. Reduce investment risk to more comfortable levels by calculating your attitude to risk, then building a suitable welldiversified portfolio around your risk tolerance, circumstances and objectives.



Shopping habits have changed for good, says Aldi

The cost-of-living crisis has changed shopping habits for good, according to the boss of Aldi in the UK and Ireland. Cheaper supermarket own-label ranges are enjoying a boom as shoppers try to save money.

Aldi overtook Morrisons last year to become the UK's fourth-biggest supermarket. Alongside rival Lidl it has been the fastest-growing this year.

Products that are sold under a supermarket's own name now make up more than half of everything shoppers buy, by value. The vast majority of the products Aldi and Lidl sell are own-label.

An eccentric former accountant is facing jail after she waged a YouTube hate campaign against her exasperated neighbours during a bitter feud about car parking in the street, littering, Brexit and her pet turkeys.

'Future-proof' vaccine may protect against new variants of Covid

A vaccine candidate dubbed "future-proof" may one day be able to protect against all future variants of SARS-CoV-2 the virus that causes COVID-19. This is the tantalizing promise of an international team of researchers led from the University of Cambridge, England and spin-off firm DIOSynVax. Studies undertaken in guinea pigs, mice and rabbits found an experimental vaccine provided a strong immune response against all known variants of SARS-CoV-2 as well as a range of other coronaviruses, including those responsible for the 2002 SARS epidemic.

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Preparation:-

In the large bowl of a stand mixer fitted with the whisk attachment (or in a large bowl using an electric mixer) on medium speed, beat powdered sugar and butter until pale and fluffy, about 2 minutes. Add egg and continue to beat until incorporated and fluffy, about 1 minute more. Add almond extract, vanilla extract, and food colouring and beat until combined.

In a small bowl, whisk flour and salt. Add to butter mixture and beat on low speed until just combined. Fold in pistachios. Cover bowl with plastic wrap and refrigerate at least 30 minutes or up to 2 days.

Line 2 rimmed baking sheets with parchment paper. Remove one-quarter of dough from refrigerator and portion into 12 to 13 (1-tablespoon) balls. Roll each ball between your palms until it starts to form a finger shape, about 3"-by-1/2", or the length of your pinky finger but slightly thinner. Arrange logs on prepared sheet and press an almond slice into each, where the nail would be on a finger. Carefully pinch dough just below almond and halfway down log to create a knuckle. Using a sharp knife, carve horizontal lines of varying lengths into knuckle. Place 1 or 2 pistachio pieces in finger to make warts. Repeat with remaining dough. Freeze 30 minutes.

Preheat oven to 375°. Bake, rotating trays front to back halfway through, until edges are firm and tops of cookies are dry, 7 to 9 minutes, Let cool slightly.

Gently lift off almond fingernail. Add a tiny dab of jam to tip of finger, then replace almond fingernail, pressing down to make jam ooze out. Spread jam onto bottom of each finger. Let cookies cool completely.

Preparation:-

Heat outdoor grill or grill pan.

Gently mix ground meats and Worcestershire sauce in medium bowl with a fork until blended. Shape meat into four patties about 1 in. thick. Sprinkle both sides of patties with salt and pepper. Coat burgers with nonstick spray. Grill, turning once, 8 to 10 minutes until instant-read thermometer inserted from side to middle registers 160°F. Serve on buns with lettuce, sliced tomato and red onion.

Kosher salt and pepper
4 medium pimiento-stuffed olives

Preparation:-

Place the eggs in a large saucepan, add enough cold water to reach 2 in. above submerged eggs, and bring to a boil. Remove from heat, cover the saucepan and let stand for 12 minutes. Meanwhile, in a small bowl, whisk together the sour cream, taco sauce and chili powder. Place in a pastry bag fitted with a fine writing tip.

In a second small bowl, mash the avocado with the lemon juice and $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp each salt and pepper. Transfer to a resealable plastic bag and cut off the tip to create a $\frac{1}{2}$ in. opening.

Drain the eggs and return them to the saucepan. Gently shake the saucepan to crack the eggs all over. Run under cold water to cool, then peel the eggs. Cut the eggs in half lengthwise. Remove the yolks and save for another use.

Using the sour cream mixture, pipe thin squiggly lines on each egg white half so they resemble bloodshot eyes. Pipe the avocado mixture into each white and place a slice of olive on top.



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PHYSIOTHERAPY, AN EFFECTIVE ALTERNATIVE TO COMBAT OSTEOPOROSIS



As the years go by, our bone tissue weakens, but it should not do so at such a rate that it incapacitates us to live with a desirable quality of life. The loss of bone density has become an epidemic that affects more and more people. Osteoporosis is today a great personal and social problem, it causes multiple discomforts in the development of daily life, it generates disability and sometimes intense pain, as this pathology progresses, the danger of a fracture increases.

The bones form the structure of our body, they are the solid

anchor on which the rest of what we are is based, when they begin to weaken, the danger that lies in wait for us is more than serious, the bone density of the bones decreases and they begin to slide into a spongy fragility that increases the risk of major pathologies.

Osteoporosis presents itself as a silent pathology and once it appears it seems that we are forced to endure it without being able to do anything other than arm ourselves with patience and bear its negative effects. Nothing is further from reality, if we have not had healthy habits oriented towards prevention, which is the best medicine against osteoporosis, we can still face it without letting ourselves be carried away by despondency.

If our diet has been unhealthy up to now and our favourite exercise is practiced from the chair, with a diagnosis of osteoporosis we have no alternative: we have to change our habits, the doctor will provide us with a diet and calcium and vitamin support to maintain the quality of our bones, physiotherapy will favour the recovery of general activity and can even increase our density of bone tissu

There are several types of osteoporosis, we are going to refer in this article to the possible treatment with Physiotherapy of the most common, those derived

from increasing age, postmenopausal and after immobilization or fracture.

Treatment of osteoporosis with Physiotherapy.

1.- In the first place, we must recommend magnetotherapy, it will be useful in all cases, paying special attention to the indications of each team, magnetotherapy has few contraindications, but we must be attentive to them.

The required characteristics of a good magnetotherapy equipment are:

- First of all, that it is a device with sanitary registration, be careful with the "complies with all electromagnetism standards" and the addition of images with various certificates, it must clearly indicate that it is a device with CE sanitary certification.

- A minimum of 100 Gauss is recommended, below that a significant increase in treatment time is required. If we can have 150 Gauss better, above that power the equipment becomes more expensive and it does not necessarily imply added advantages.

2.- Therapeutic exercise, if immobilization and lack of activity favour osteoporosis, active kinesitherapy is our essential ally. When the muscles pull the bone tissue, they favour its mineralization, therefore a programmed moderate physical activity will be one of the best allies in the fight against osteoporosis. The physiotherapist is the specialist in therapeutic exercise and in all kinds of physical therapies, his collaboration is necessary to obtain optimal results.

Within the therapeutic exercise, swimming is sometimes ruled out because it does not imply a great load against gravity, we must be careful with this because we often find ourselves with elderly people in whom walking and precisely swimming due precisely to the support of the water, they are almost the only physical activities of a general type that can be carried out, it is always better to swim if you cannot exercise with a greater load.

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3.- Postural education. Basically, exercise is posture in movement, the physiotherapist is the specialist in postural education, since osteoporosis can affect generating pain while standing, sitting or lying down, the physiotherapist will help the patient both to allow him to reach a series of appropriate postures and to carry out the transitions.

4.- Relaxation techniques, relaxation techniques promote circulation and raise the pain threshold naturally, with them the patient regains some control over his pathology, relaxation has a balancing effect on our homeostasis, if we teach relaxation to our patients, we provide them with a technique that can be useful on many occasions.

A good diagnosis is essential, after the medical treatment the physiotherapist is the indispensable figure to improve the quality of life of the patient, if we have the collaboration of the patient, a personalized treatment with magnetotherapy and therapeutic exercise, counting on the rest of physical therapies to our disposition will provide the best options for a pathology that today affects an increasing number of people.

Hypoglycaemia

A condition characterised by an abnormally low level of blood sugar, is commonly associated with diabetes. However, a variety of conditions, many of them rare, can cause low blood sugar in people without diabetes. Like fever, hypoglycaemia isn't a disease itself, it's an indicator of a health problem.

Symptoms include shakiness, weakness, faintness, headaches, mental dullness and confusion. Such symptoms can be caused by any number of other problems, including stress. The only wat to diagnose hypoglycaemia is through a glucose tolerance test, the same type of test used to diagnose diabetes. Immediate treatment of hypoglycaemia involves quick steps to get your blood sugar level back into a normal range, either with high-sugar foods or medications. However, long term treatment requires identifying and treating the underlying causer of hypoglycaemia.

How your blood sugar falls too low There are several reasons blood sugar falls too low, the most common being a side effect of drugs used for the treatment of diabetes. But to understand how hypoglycaemia happens, it is good to know how your body normally regulates blood sugar production, absorption and storage. During digestion, your body breaks down carbohydrates from foods, such as bread, rice, pasta, vegetables, fruit and milk products, into different sugar molecules. One of these sugar molecules is glucose, the main energy source for your body. After you eat, glucose is absorbed directly into your bloodstream, but it isn't able to enter cells of most of your tissues without the help of insulin, a hormone secreted by vour pancreas.

When the level of glucose in your blood rises, it signals beta cells in the endocrine portion of your pancreas to release insulin. The insulin, in turn, unlocks your cells so that glucose can enter and provide the fuel your cells need to function properly. Any extra glucose is stored in your level and muscles in the form of glycogen. This process works to regulate the level of glucose in your bloodstream and prevents it from reaching dangerously high levels. As your blood sugar level returns to normal, so does the secretion of insulin from your pancreas. If you haven't eaten for several hours and your blood sugar level starts dropping, glucagon - another hormone from your pancreas - signals your liver to break down the stored glycogen and release glucose back into your bloodstream.

Aside from your liver breaking down

glycogen into glucose, your body also is able to manufacture glucose in a process called gluconeogenesis. This process occurs primarily in your liver, but also in your kidneys, and makes use of various substances that are precursors to glucose.

Possible causes of hypoglycaemia Diabetes

If you have diabetes, the effects of insulin on your body are drastically diminished, either because your pancreas doesn't produce enough of it (type 1 diabetes) or because your cells are less responsive to it (type 2 diabetes). As a result, glucose tends to build up in your bloodstream and may reach dangerously high levels. To correct this problem, you likely take insulin or other drugs designed to lower blood sugar levels. If you take too much insulin relative to the amount of glucose in your bloodstream, it can cause your blood sugar levels to drop too low, resulting in hypoglycaemia. Hypoglycaemia may also result if, after taking your diabetes medication, you don't eat as much as usual (ingesting less glucose) than you normally would. To prevent this from happening, your doctor should work with you to find the optimum dosage that fits your regular eating and activity habits.

Without diabetes causes may include the following: **Medications.** Taking someone else's oral diabetes medication accidently is a possible cause of hypoglycaemia. Other medications may also cause hypoglycaemia, for example quinine.

Excessive alcohol consumption. Drinking heavily without eating can block your liver from releasing stored glucose into your bloodstream, causing hypoglycaemia. **Some critical illnesses.** Severe illnesses of the liver, such as severe hepatitis, can cause hypoglycaemia. Disorders of the kidney, which can keep your body from properly excreting medications, can affect glucose levels due to a build up of those medications. Long-term starvation, such as in anorexia nervosa, can result in the depletion of substances your body needs in gluconeogenesis, causing hypoglycaemia.

Tumours. A rare tumour of the pancreas, insulinoma, may cause overproduction of insulin. Other tumours may result

in excessive production of insulin-like substances. Or, then tumours themselves may use up too much glucose. Enlargement of beta cells of the pancreas that produce insulin, nesidioblastosis, may result in excessive insulin release, causing hypoglycaemia. People who've undergone gastric bypass surgery are at risk of this condition.

Endocrine deficiencies. Certain disorders of the adrenal glands and the pituitary gland can result in a deficiency of key hormones that regulate glucose production. Hypoglycaemia after meals. Most hypoglycaemia occurs when you haven't eaten (when you're in a fasting state), but that's not always the case. Sometimes, hypoglycaemia occurs after meals because the body produces more insulin than is needed.

Complications. If you ignore the symptoms of hypoglycaemia too long, you may lose consciousness because your brain needs glucose to function. **Hypoglycaemia and Diet.**

Doctors used to recommend eating sugar. Restricted, high-protein meals four or more times a day to help control hypoglycaemia. But such treatment may actually impair glucose in patients. The main sources of protein for many individuals, animal products, are also high in fat which can contribute to the development of diabetes, as well as numerous other health problems, from heart disease to breast cancer. The best way to control hypoglycaemia is through a diet similar to that used to control diabetes mellitus: a reduction in simple sugars, a large intake of complex carbohydrates, and frequent feedings. Candy, sodas, and even fruit juices (which manufacturers often sweeten with lots of sugar) are all high in sugar and should be avoided. Foods that are high in soluble dietary fibre slow carbohydrate absorption and help prevent swings in blood sugar levels. For some, fruits may also be a good addition as fructose, the natural sugar in most fruits, does not require insulin to be absorbed into the body cells.

Also advised is an increase in meal frequency. Eating more than three meals per day helps maintain blood sugar levels and to prevent the onset of hypoglycaemia symptoms.

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,8 reasons why you wake up tired, and how to fix it

1. Fatigue

"There are a lot of conditions that cause fatigue, but they don't necessarily make people feel like they're ready to fall asleep," said Jennifer Martin, a professor of medicine at the David Geffen School of Medicine at UCLA and a former president of the American Academy of Sleep Medicine. These can include chronic pain conditions, metabolic or thyroid conditions, anemia and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease. If you're feeling inexplicable fatigue, "an important first step might just be a routine physical with your family doctor," Martin said. Additionally, the National Sleep Foundation has said healthy adults need seven to nine hours of sleep nightly, so you might need more than eight hours of sleep to feel energized. You could try going to sleep an hour earlier or waking an hour later than usual and see if that makes a difference, said Christopher Barnes, a professor of management at the University of Washington who studies the relationship between sleep and work.

2. Sedentary lifestyle

If you're sedentary, your body can get used to having to expend low levels of energy, so you might feel more tired than you should when trying to do basic daily activities, Martin said. The World Health Organization has recommended that adults get at least 150 minutes (2½ hours) of moderate-to-vigorous physical activity weekly, while pregnant people should do at least 150 minutes of moderate aerobic and strengthening exercises per week.

3. Anxiety or depression

Having anxiety or depression can be energetically taxing, Dasgupta said. These conditions can also negatively influence the time needed to fall asleep as well as whether (and how many times) you wake up throughout the night, he added. And sometimes the



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medications used to treat depression or anxiety can have side effects such as insomnia or disruption of deeper stages of sleep, Dasgupta said.

4. Inconsistent sleep

Sometimes our schedules differ on weekdays versus weekends, Barnes said. Schedules can also fluctuate for people with shiftbased jobs. "A very common practice would be to say, 'OK, well, it's Friday night. I don't have to work tomorrow morning, so I can stay up a bit later,' " Barnes said. Maybe you stay up even later Saturday night since you don't have to work Sunday either, then go to bed earlier on Sunday ahead of the workweek. But by this point, you've already adjusted your sleep schedule back by a couple of hours in a short period of time. "This is very much analogous to jet lag," Barnes said. "That rapid reset doesn't work very well."

5. Dehydration

More than 50% of your body is made of water, which is needed for multiple functions including digesting food, creating hormones and neurotransmitters, and delivering oxygen throughout your body, according to the Cleveland Clinic. Being dehydrated has been linked to decreased alertness and increased sleepiness and fatigue.

The Institute of Medicine recommends that women consume 2.7 liters (91 ounces) of fluids daily and that men have 3.7 liters (125 ounces) daily. This recommendation includes all fluids and water-rich foods such as fruits, vegetables and soups. Since the average water intake ratio of fluids to foods is around 80:20, that amounts to a daily amount of 9 cups for women and 12½ cups for men.

6. Poor sleep environment or routine

Having good sleep hygiene includes keeping your bedroom dark, quiet and cold at night and only using it for sleep and sex. Avoid consuming caffeinated drinks less than six hours before bedtime and limit the consumption of alcohol and heavy or spicy foods at least two hours before bed. Alcohol can prevent deeper stages of sleep, and such foods can cause digestive issues that interfere with restorative sleep.

7. Sleep partner problems

"The person (or pet) with whom you share a bed has a big impact on your sleep," Martin said. Maybe your bed partner has a sleep disorder and snores or tosses and turns. Or maybe the person has a different schedule that's disruptive to your sleep. Pets can also disrupt your sleep schedule since they don't have the same sleep patterns as humans, she added.

"The most important thing if your bed partner snores is to get them to see a sleep specialist and have them evaluated for sleep apnea," Martin said. Sleep apnea, a condition wherein breathing stops and restarts while someone's sleeping is common in people who snore, she added.

8. Sleep disorders


On that note, sleep disorders are another factor that can dramatically diminish sleep quality, Barnes said. Someone with sleep apnea might wake up 50 times, 100 times or even more throughout the night, he added. "Once you're awake, you're no longer in the deep sleep, and you don't get to usually drop immediately into the deepest sleep," Barnes said.

"Bringing people out of that deep sleep by waking them up is going to generally result in less time spent in the deepest stage of sleep." Other sleep disorders that can affect daily energy levels include narcolepsy and restless legs syndrome, according to the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

The ideal way to track sleep quality and quantity, especially if you think you could be diagnosed with a sleep disorder, is undergoing polysomnography at a sleep clinic, Barnes said. Apps and electronic wearables such as watches or rings that measure sleep aren't as accurate as clinic tests, but still provide sufficient information for healthy adults, Barnes said. "I'd want to know that it was developed and then validated against another, more accurate device."



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




