

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### Indian tequila: One man's quest to perfect a national spirit

Indian tequila: one man's quest to perfect a national spirit

What happens when you try making tequila, Mexico's drink, in India? Alex Travellii downs a glass to find out...

In a quiet part of Goa on the west coast of India, three identical enamelled cups were perched on a bar. Each contained a clear alcohol, in one cup was a local Indian spirit. The other two had different brands of mezcal. This spirit is made from agave, a plant grown across a semi-arid swathe of Mexico. the best known variant of which produces tequila. To judge the drinks, a veteran of boozy sabbaticals in Oaxaca, the spiritual home of all mezcals, sipped from each cup twice. He couldn't identify the Indian Why should anyone care which was imposter. mezcal or the home-grown approximation? The pursuit of authenticity is a funny thing. The bizarre case of India's first and only agave spirit is a prime example of that.

Desmond Nazareth, a year old from Mumbai, has spent the past years working to perfect an Indian equivalent to tequila and other mezcals. It is made from semi-wild agave, more than km from tequila's cultural and legal home. A cartoon motif of Nazareth appears on a range of orange plastic screw capped bottles labelled "Indian Agave spirits" under the brand name Desmoindji and Dj. Though it is still a fairly small operation, some 13.00 cases, each containing nine-litres, were sold and demand is growing. The drinks are now available in a number of bars and shops in the more liberal parts of India.

Tequila is made from blue agave, a particular variety of spiny succulent native to Mesoamerica which can be found on Mexico's dusty plains. Mezcal, its country cousin, can be made from a number of different agaves. Like many other

regional foodstuffs, parmesan and champagne among them, there are tight restrictions over what products can be called tequila or mezcal. According to World Trade Organisation regulations, no spirit with these names can be made anywhere else in the world. In the 1980s Nazareth moved to America to study film-making. During this time he began making cocktails as a way "to please people, or to charm them". The margarita was an indispensable part of his arsenal. But when he moved back to Mumbai in 2000, he found that the main ingredient for his drink of choice was both scarce and pricey. Nazareth had a hunch that the terroir of India's semi-arid Deccan plateau might be similar to that of central Mexico. He knew that agave plants, brought by European colonists centuries ago, already criss-crossed the landscape. A good agave plant atkes 10 to 12 years to mature. But mimicking the correct method of distilling is tricky. To make tequila, the barrel shaped trunks of mature agave are pared-down, steamed and finally

distilled in special copper stills. The right equipment isn't sold outside Mexico. So, in 2007, Nazareth and his business partner went as sightseers to see how the experts did it. The pair were welcomed by producers in and around the town of Tequila, and took pictures of the machinery. When they returned to India, they commissioned steelmakers to make pressure chambers, guillotine like cutters to slice up the agave hearts and distilling pots. Nazareth opened his factory in 2010. He built what he described as "madness in the middle of nowhere". The first thing you see as you approach the site in Andhra Pradesh in south-east India is a curious looking water tower, built in the shape of a Martini glass. On the star shaped plot, surrounded by fields, one man's daydream has become India's first craft distillery. The borders, which stretch to 2.5km, are planted high with manicured giant agave. Over the past decade, tens of thousands of their offspring have been propagated in the surrounding countryside.

A neat cluster of buildings inside the perimeter is painted pink to match the granite hillside at sunset. Workers swing a long-handled version of an Indian sickle to first cut off its spiny leaves and hack down the agave, and then later to trim clean the agave hearts (they find the Indian tool nimbler than the traditional Mexican hoe, the coa de jima). Others load discarded biomass into a furnace. Technicians mind the towering, stainless-steel vats of agave juice. It ferments in one vat and is then moved to the pot stills.

Nazareth took on his first employee in 2007, now

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

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he has 32 people working for him. But he encounters bureaucratic obstacles at every corner. In the early days, Mexican trade officials called him to ask if he was producing their national spirit. When he told them he weas producing "Indian agave spirits" they let him be. But the Indian authorities couldn't work out what licence Nazareth needed to sell his produce.

One official asked him, "What the hell is agave?" Another told him that he needed an Ayurvedic licence, which usually covers the production of natural medicine.

Though many types of alcohol are available in India, they are often drunk under a puritanical glare. Imports are expensive and can be bought only in the metropolitan centres of some states. Where booze is legal, rough and tumble stores do brisk business.

Some shops sell crude "country wine". Others offer heavily taxed Indian Made Foreign Liquor, which starts life as a "neutral spirit", an ethanol that can be made from molasses, rice or wheat. Artificial colour and flavouring are added later and the mixture is watered down.

This end product may then be labelled whisky, gin, rum or nearly anything else.

In contrast to these ethanol based drinks, Nazareth's agave spirits come straight from the field just like the Mexican original.

Nazareth also faces another hurdle: sentimental

drinkers who want the real thing. Indian agave spirits have no place on the world stage. Since the shelves of supermarkets around the world are already well stocked with authentic teguila, the only sizeable market the Indian one is likely to find is a local one (though Nazareth's product has been sold in America since 2017). But Nazareth is tenacious.

Recently he turned his distilling expertise to mahua, a traditional Indian moonshine made from the dried flower of the mahua tree.

Nazareth now has the backing of the government of several Indian states to make his new production benefit the tribal people who've drunk it for centuries.

Unlike his Indian agave, he hopes it could someday become to India what tequila is to Mexico or whisky is to Scotland.

Indians could rally round it with patriotic fervour and foreign drinkers might swoon at its exotic bouquet.

Even if it does taste a bit like grappa.

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## **Spanish Winter Evergreens**



Cheddar Pink (Dianthus gratianopolitanus)
Dianthus gratianopolitanus – Cheddar Pink

Has neat and tidy mounds of blue-gray, linear leaves that develop into broad mats that are 12 inches (30 cm) or more in width.

The low-growing silvery foliage contrasts nicely with other perennials. Flowers will continue all winter.

#### Helleborus

This genus has tons of choices that fits most climates. The Christmas Rose is popular for its midwinter white flowers. Others have flowers in shades of green, red, and purple.

Awesome for winter interest, it has great foliage and flowers.

Autumn Joy (Sedum 'Herbstfreude')

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#### Sedum 'Herbstfreude' - 'Autumn Joy'

This plant has fleshy leaves and grows to 24 in (60 cm). It has large heads of pink flowers that appear in autumn and eventually fade to copper colour and then turn red.

So do not cut them back until the spring to get the most interest from this plant.



### Lilytuft (Liriope muscari and spicata) Liriope muscari and spicata – Lilyturf

A clump forming perennial with beautiful flowers and eye-catching foliage. This is good to group with other plants for interest. Good for a ground cover or path edging.



# Italian Acum (Arum italicum) Arum italicum – Italian Arum

Grows to 12 inches (30 cm). This is a tuberous perennial with broad arrow-shaped leaves that appear in the autumn. The foliage dies back in the summer just as the decorative red berries appear. 
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

and I nearly forgot ... I'm completely deaf. I've been living with my new foster family now for nearly a year. I say family as there's quite a lot of us - mum and dad of course, a handful of very excitable chickens, 3 annoying cats and best of all seven 4-legged friends like me!! SEVEN!!! Can you believe it!! After having no friends at all I now have 7 - I'm really part of their gang. I'm also getting along with the cats although they do creep up on me, scare me and make me cross. Mum says that's just because I can't hear them!

So I imagine you might be wondering about me being deaf? Well it's not the best thing to be is it but I think it makes some people extra specially nice to me

To start with my mum and dad are teaching me hand signals. So I've learnt when to come to them, when I'm good and behaving well (and when I'm not) and also when it's time for food. I picked THAT signal up really quickly which wasn't hard as all my other friends go crazy when it's brekkie or teatime. In fact I've learnt a lot of important things by just watching them

What I do find challenging is the actual space around me. What I mean by that is sometimes when I lay on the floor, I get up and bump into my mum or dad or even step on the smaller animals - I do seem to get in people's way quite a bit and I know I'm VERY clumsy because of my size.

However I've noticed that the grownups are starting to watch out for me when they move about. It can be really tricky when we're all in the kitchen but overtime it's got better - they have been very patient with me. When I first arrived at my new foster home I was so bewildered and unsure what to do and where to go, that I just sat on my dad's lap for an hour. Normal dogs would find it scary too with all the noise and commotion but of course I couldn't hear a thing. For the first few weeks I would hide in the bathroom - sometimes I'd even get into the empty bath to hide

The other problem I have is that I have no idea when people come to our house to visit. I can't hear cars arriving, or the sound of footsteps or the door ringing. This frightens me so my mum and dad always take me

outside and let me see who's arriving and give me time to get used to them. So I think that's about it ... except that I really really really hate flies and wasps. I'm always chasing them and trying to snap them up. My dad says that it's a blessing I can't hear them buzzing else I'd be knocking everything and everyone over!! Oh my mum has asked me to tell you about what SHE thinks is the cutest and most lovable thing about me which is that they have to physically wake me up most mornings as I don't hear the alarm clock or the other dogs getting excited to go out. #### **Dog Training Classes**

If your dog isn't the anxious or aggressive type, group dog training classes are a great way to kickstart you and your dog's training education. Learning to interact and communicate with your dog in a public place even just one hour a week will improve your relationship immensely.

As a dog trainer and group class instructor, I wanted to compile a list of the things you need to know in order to get the most out of your experience. If you follow these simple tips, you and your dog are sure to be at the top of your class!

1. Bring extra special food rewards! Group training classes are full of exciting, interesting, and distracting things. Let's be real, your dog would much rather explore

real, your dog would much rather explore and socialise than learn to "stay". What's a dog parent to do? Up the ante! Bring some sort of reward that your dog would never get at home, like boiled chicken or string cheese. It can also be helpful to bring an extra special toy to keep things interesting! Get creative and have fun with it.

Bonus tip: Having a treat pouch or bag can also be very helpful. Treat pouches allow you to reinforce behaviour much faster and more easily than having treats in a plastic bag or in your pocket.

#### 2. Ask Questions

If your teacher explains something that you don't quite understand, ask follow up questions. As instructors, we do not expect our students to be dog trainers. We love when pet owners go the extra mile to understand the content taught in class. Don't be shy! If you need extra help with something, speak up, that's what we're here for!

#### 3. Take your dog outside

If the only place (outside of your normal home/walk routine) you bring your dog each week is training class — good luck! Imagine if you only left your home for one outing a week, and this outing was the only place where you had the opportunity to hang out with other people, and here you were expected to give someone your undivided attention.

Now imagine you were a puppy being asked to do this. It's the same for our dogs!

When you give your puppy or dog the opportunity to become accustomed to being in new places a few times a week, this ensures they are being set up for success and can learn and engage successfully when they actually go to their weekly dog training class. The goal is to desensitise your dog to the hustle and bustle of the outside world. This way, group dog training class will just be another place of the many places they get to go.

Getting your dog to a new place away from your regular home/walking route at least three times a week is a great start!

#### 4. Practice during the week

Just like any experience, you will get out of your group dog training class what you put into it. If your dog only practices the skills taught in class, in class, then you won't get very much out of it. Practice the skills you're learning in your group dog training class everywhere! Practice at home, on walks, in

the car, at the park, and any public place where dogs are allowed; practice in busy areas with distractions.

If you need more inspiration or guidance, ask your trainer for homework assignments. We have plenty of ideas on how to make this training stuff stick.

#### 5. Be patient!

This is likely going to be one of the most difficult and demanding experiences your dog will ever have! Don't expect your dog to be perfect by the end of the first class. In fact, expect them to be all over the place. Group class for your dog is like what Disneyworld is for a small child. There's so much going on and it's super distracting. Try to be kind and understanding of this, or better yet, enjoy it! Dogs are hilarious. Revel in the joy and ridiculousness of your dogs behavior and try not to worry so much about them being perfect right away. It's also important to be patient with yourself! This stuff is not easy and learning to 'speak dog' can be a little daunting at first. Give yourself time and you'll be fluent in no time.

## 6. Don't stop training stop after class is over because training never stops!

This is the big one. One of the most common questions I've been asked as an animal trainer is, 'How long does it take to train a dog?' I think this question is indicative of a general misunderstanding of what training actually is.

Training is teaching. Learning to train your dog is simply learning how to teach your dog in a way that they will understand. When a student is training to become a doctor for example, there is a school/university period, certainly, but the training never really ends. The doctor is practicing their basic skills every day and is hopefully taking opportunities to learn new ones. Luckily for us our average pet doesn't need to learn how to perform surgery, but the general concept of training and learning and



communicating is universal. Have your dog practice those basic skills every day, and try to continue to expand those basic behaviours throughout their lives.

#### 7. Make it fun!

Training class does not need to be serious. It should be fun! If you aren't having fun in class, your dog probably isn't either. Dogs learn through play — the more playful you can be in class, the better. And the best part about making it fun is that you will enjoy class more as well!

Take a look at some of the classes on offer at Dog School – Beginners Life Skills – start your training off by learning the basics in a fun, supportive class. Agility is a great way to give a busy dog the exercise they need or build confidence in a shy rescue dog. You don't have to be a fitness freak to take part! It's all on our website at

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**Butternut Squash Soup with crisp Pancetta** 

#### **Butternut Squash Soup with Crisp Pancetta**

#### Ingredients:-

4 medium butternut squash (6 pounds)

6 tablespoons unsalted butter, cut into 8 pieces

Kosher salt

Freshly ground black pepper

12 very thin slices of pancetta (3 ounces)

2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil, plus more for drizzling

1 large Spanish onion, chopped

6 thyme sprigs, divided

1 bay leaf

2 quarts chicken stock or low-sodium broth

2 tablespoons heavy cream

Sugar (optional)

#### Preparation:-

Preheat the oven to 400°F. Halve the squash lengthwise and scoop out the seeds. Set the squash on a rimmed baking sheet, cut sides up. Put a piece of butter in each



cavity and season generously with salt and pepper. Drape the squash halves with the pancetta slices. Roast the squash for 45 to 50 minutes, or until tender.

Transfer the pancetta to paper towels to drain. Crumble and set aside. Scoop the squash out of the skins into a

In a large, heavy stockpot, heat the 2 tablespoons of olive oil until shimmering. Add the onion, season with salt and pepper, and cook over moderately high heat, stirring, until softened but not browned, about 6 minutes. Add 3 of the thyme sprigs and the bay leaf. Stir in the squash and the stock and bring to a boil over high heat, stirring frequently. Reduce the heat and simmer the soup for 15 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Pick out and discard the thyme sprigs and bay leaf. Working in batches, transfer the soup to a blender or food processor and puree until thick and creamy-smooth, about 1 minute per batch. Transfer the soup to a clean saucepan. Stir in the heavy cream and season with salt and pepper (and sugar if desired).

Reheat the soup if necessary. Ladle into 12 bowls. Garnish the soup with the pancetta, the leaves from the remaining 3 thyme sprigs, and a drizzle of olive oil.

#### Rustic Apple-Rye Bread

#### Ingredients:-

Cracked Rye Soaker 3/4 cup cracked rye berries (about 3 1/2 ounces) .50 cup boiling water .50 cup buttermilk 1/4 cup cold water (about 60°F) tablespoon mature

sourdough starter (about 1/2 ounce) 1/2 cup whole-grain

dark rye flour (about 1 1/8 ounces)

2.50 cups warm water (about 80°F), divided

6.50 cups bread flour (about 1 3/4 pounds)

1.50 cups whole-grain dark rye flour (about 6 3/8 ounces), plus more for work surface

2.50 tablespoons kosher salt

Cooking spray

2 medium apples (about 13 ounces), unpeeled and cut in 1/4-inch pieces (about 2 1/2 cups)

1/4 cup raisins

1 tsp ground cinnamon (preferably Ceylon)

Hot water, for steaming

#### Preparation:-

Make the cracked rye soaker: Stir together cracked rye berries and 1/2 cup boiling water in a small heatproof bowl. Let stand 1 hour. Stir in buttermilk. Cover and let stand at room temperature overnight (12 to 16 hours).

Meanwhile, make the rye levain.

Stir together 1/4 cup cold water and sourdough starter in a 2-cup liquid measuring cup until starter is mostly dissolved. Stir in flour until smooth. Cover tightly with plastic wrap, and let stand at room temperature until mixture is bubbly, at least doubled in volume, and smells sour like yogurt, 12 to 16 hours.

Make the dough Combine rye levain and 2 1/4 cups warm water in a large bowl. Stir well until levain is mostly dissolved. Add bread flour and rye flour; mix with hands until all ingredients are well combined with no dry spots.

Cover with a clean towel, and let stand at room temperature until dough stiffens slightly, about 30 minutes. Add salt and remaining 1/4 cup warm water to dough in bowl. Using a squeezing motion, incorporate salt and water into dough. Stretch and fold dough onto itself in bowl until it forms a tight and mostly smooth ball, 3 to 4 minutes. Cover bowl with a clean towel, and let stand at warm room temperature (about 80°F) until airy and slightly risen, about 2 hours, performing a set of stretch and folds (4 folds in every set and rotating bowl 90 degrees after each) every 30 minutes.

Add cracked rye soaker to dough. Stretch and fold dough back onto itself in bowl until cracked rye mixture is mostly combined, about 1 minute. Cover bowl with a clean towel, and let stand until slightly risen, about 1 hour, performing 1 set of stretch and folds after 30 minutes.

Turn dough out onto a lightly greased (with cooking spray) work surface. Using hands, gently stretch dough into a 16-x 12-inch rectangle. Sprinkle evenly with apples, raisins, and cinnamon. Starting from a short end, roll dough up jelly roll–style. Fold one-third of roll in toward centre and other third on top, like a letter, and return to large bowl. Cover with a clean towel, and let stand at room temperature 1 hour and 30 minutes, performing 1 set of stretch and folds after 45 minutes.

Turn dough out onto a lightly floured (with rye flour) work surface, and divide in half (about 2 1/2 pounds each). Shape each half into a ball. Cover with a clean towel, and let stand 20 minutes.

Invert a 4-inch bowl, and place it inside of a 9-inch bowl. Line larger bowl with a linen kitchen towel, draping it over inverted bowl to form a ring-shaped moat. Dust towel generously with rye flour. Repeat with a second set of bowls, a towel, and rye flour. Set aside. Working with 1 dough ball at a time and keeping remaining dough covered, uncover and dust lightly with rye flour. Press bottom of a pint glass (about 2 1/4 inches wide) firmly into centre of dough ball to form an indentation. Keeping dough ball on work surface, poke through centre of indenation using fingers to form a hole, stretching hole to about 4 inches in diameter, dusting generously with flour as needed to prevent sticking. Invert dough ring onto 1 prepared proofing bowl so that hole in centre fits around inverted 4-inch bowl. Repeat process with second dough ball. Cover each bowl with a clean towel, and let stand at room temperature until slightly risen, about 1 hour. Transfer covered bowls to refrigerator, and chill overnight (12 to 16 hours).

Preheat oven to 500°F with a pizza stone on centre rack. Place a baking pan (such as a 9-inch round cake pan) on lowest oven rack under pizza stone during final 5 minutes of preheating. Working with 1 loaf at a time and keeping remaining loaf in refrigerator, invert loaf onto a parchment paper-lined baking sheet or a parchment paper-lined pizza peel. Using a small, sharp knife or a lame, cut about 6 (3- to 4-inch-long) slashes (about 1/4 inch deep) into top of loaf. Slide loaf from parchment-lined baking sheet onto preheated pizza stone. Using a kettle or a measuring cup with a long spout, carefully and quickly pour hot water into cake pan to a depth of about 1/2 inch. Immediately close oven door to trap steam. Reduce oven temperature to 475°F, and bake until loaf is dark golden and internal temperature registers 205°F, 30 to 35 minutes. (Remove cake pan from oven if all water evaporates before loaf is finished baking.) Transfer loaf to a wire rack, and let cool completely, about 2 hours. Meanwhile, repeat process with second loaf, letting oven preheat to 500°F and refilling cake pan with hot water in between loaves.

# Apple Cider Aperol Spritz

Ingredients:1 1/2 ounces
apple cider
(store-bought)
3 ounces
Prosecco
1 1/2 ounces
soda water
1 apple slice
(for garnish)
1 pod star anise
(for garnish)



**Apple Cider Aperol Spritz** 

#### Preparation:-

Make apple cider (if using homemade). Wash, de-core, and quarter your apples and add them to a large pot or dutch oven along with the quartered orange.

Add brown sugar, all spice, cloves, star anise, cinnamon stick, nutmeg, cardamom pods, and water. Stir until combined, about 30 seconds.

Simmer dutch oven on low heat for four hours. Using a wooden spoon, crush down apples until texture resembles applesauce

Strain mixture through a fine mesh sieve.

Strain, again, through cheesecloth over the fine-mesh sieve.

Add apple cider to a wine glass along with Aperol. Add 3 to 4 ounces of Prosecco and ice.


Top with about an ounce of soda water.

Garnish with star anise and apple slice.



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# **EXERCISE AND CANCER HOW?, WHEN? AND WHY?**



#### Introduction

Too often we are greeted by cancer patients with low levels of physical activity and/or generalized disacondition. Sometimes this situation comes from afar and occurs because the person has never been physically active or has performed little exercise, but many times we encounter patients who were active and have ceased to be so because they believed that in their situation the exercise was discouraged or because they are afraid that their symptoms will worsen. Although this trend has

been reversed over time among patients with chronic pathologies, especially cardiac or respiratory diseases, mainly thanks mainly to the efforts of the scientific community to investigate and disseminate the positive effects of exercise, in the case of cancer patients we find that this trend still persists.

However, the truth is that over the past two decades, multiple studies have been conducted that have shown that exercise in the oncology population is safe and feasible and is effective in improving physical condition,



cancer-related fatigue and health-related quality of life. In fact, as with respiratory or cardiac patients, physical exercise in cancer patients not only does not worsen fatigue or dyspnoea, but is the main treatment for them. But the benefits of cancer exercise are not limited to symptom control, but recent studies have observed among other effects a decrease in body weight in breast cancer, a reduction in tumor growth in patients with colon cancer, or an increase in adherence and completion rate of anti-cancer therapies such as chemotherapy.

# Benefits of physical exercise at different stages of cancer

The benefits of exercise in cancer patients extend throughout the clinical process and even begin at the preventive level. In this sense, it has been found that the practice of physical exercise is related to a lower risk of certain types of cancer such as colon, prostate or breast and very possibly has effects on the incidence of others such as lung or ovarian cancer.

According to a systematic review published in 2015, performing the equivalent of 2.5 hours of exercise per week meant a 13% reduction in the risk of cancer death. Specific programs have been launched in patients who have recently been diagnosed with cancer and are still in the pretherapeutic phase aimed at optimizing the functional status and physical condition of patients in preparation for anti-cancer therapies, especially in the case of surgical treatment. Oncology preprovisioning, as these programmes are known in the scientific field, are generally based. Specific programs have been launched in patients who have recently been diagnosed with cancer and are still in the pre-therapeutic phase aimed at optimizing the functional status and physical condition of patients in preparation for anti-cancer therapies, especially in the case of surgical treatment. Oncology pre-provisioning, as is known in the scientific field to these programs, is usually based on a multimodal intervention in which smoking disinhabitation, psychological support and nutrition are included in addition to physical exercise.

Although these programs are not yet implemented in clinical practice, several studies have shown that such programs are effective in increasing aerobic capacity, muscle strength and optimizing the nutritional profile prior to surgery, as well as accelerating post-surgery recovery. For patients receiving chemotherapy or radiation therapy, physical exercise may help to mitigate the effects of these treatments, improve physical condition even in patients in advanced stages, and improve response to treatment and survival.

As with other types of chronic pathologies, the real challenge in cancer patients is to keep the exercise practice in time. To this end it is important to



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emphasize from the outset that the benefits of exercise are only preserved if the person remains physically active on a regular basis and therefore the planning of the exercise in this population must be accompanied by a motivational interview in which the preferences of the individual are identified as well as the possible barriers and facilitators. In cancer patients, in addition to the well-known benefits of regular physical activity in the general population (reduction of cholesterol and/or blood glucose levels, reduced blood pressure, increased muscle and bone mass, etc.), in cancer patients the practice of exercise both during and after treatment is linked to a reduction in the risk of relapse and risk of death either from cancer or any other cause.



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#### Kids who watch lots of TV have a lower bone mass as adults!

KIDS WHO WATCH a lot of television may build less bone during critical vears, and be more vulnerable to osteoporosis and bone

breaks later in life as a result, a new study suggests. Children and teens followed until age 20 when bone mass is peaking - had lower bone mass at that age the more hours they had spent watching TV in childhood, researchers reported online July 4<sup>th</sup> in the Journal of Bone and Mineral Research. 'What we need to make clear is that it's not necessarily the act of watching TV that is driving the link between TV and health outcomes. but the act of sitting for long periods,' said Natalie Pearson of the School of Sport, Exercise and Health Sciences at Loughborough University in the U.K. who was not part of the new study. 'The first set of data collected on TV viewing in the current study was collected 19 years ago,' and since then more and more young people have started watching TV on demand, using IPads, smart phones and apps, she told reporters by

email. For the study, led by Joanne A. McVeigh at Curtin University in Perth, Australia, the parents of more than 1,000 Australian kids reported how much TV each child watched per week at ages 5, 8, 10, 14, 17 and 20 years - though at older ages the kids started to

self-report their own TV watching habits. Researchers sorted the kids into three groups based on their TV watching patterns over time: about 20 percent watched less than 14 hours of TV per week as children and teens and were considered consistent low-level watchers, more than 40 percent watched 14 or more hours per week as children and teens and were consistent high-level watchers, and 35 percent increased from low to high levels of TV watching per week over the vears.

At age 20 the participants had x-ray scans to assess bone mineral content. The researchers accounted for height, body mass, physical activity, calcium intake, vitamin D levels, alcohol, and smoking at age 20, and still found that kids who were consistently high-level TV watchers at younger ages had lower bone mineral content than others as adults.

Immobilisation for prolonged periods of time is detrimental to bone health, said Dr. Sebastien Chastin of Glasgow Caledonian University in the U.K., who was not part of the new study. 'Sitting watching television does two things, it takes away from being active, therefore we do not get the benefit of physical activity and second it



immobilises us for prolonged period of time which we know from bed rest studies triggers physiological response that change the balance in our body chemistry that keeps our bone strong, Chastin told reporters by email. 'Several studies have shown over the years that there is a relationship between the time we spend sitting and bone health,' he added. 'Poor bone health ultimately can lead to osteoporosis (brittle bine disease) which effects over 200 millions women worldwide,' he said 'You can imagine that a fall on a brittle hip is more likely to result in fracture. Our bodies reach peak bone density around age 22, after which time bine density decreases over time, though we can slow the decrease by maintaining an active and healthy lifestyle, Chastin

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said. 'Impact sports (not contact) are the most beneficial for bone health,' he said, citing parkour or 'free running' in particular for muscle strength, balance and coordination.

'It is often very difficult to make parents and doctors aware of the very long term health implications of sitting (at a screen or other sitting occasions such as school time, work time, travel, etc.) for long periods, as in today's society we are very interested in the immediate responses to our actions and not what will happen 20 years down the line,' Pearson said. There are practical ways to break up periods of seated screen time, like getting up during ads or while working on a computer getting up to answer the phone instead of emailing a colleague or friend, she said.



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#### Stroke physiotherapy rehabilitation

Every year nearly 600,000 people have a stroke in Spain; or 1 person has a stroke every minute. One in four stroke survivors will experience another stroke within five years.

Physiotherapy enables people to relearn lost abilities, regain independence and reduce the risk of further strokes. From 24 hours after a stroke, it is important that physiotherapists begin rehabilitation in short frequent spells, focused on getting out of bed, standing and walking. This repetitive task training helps people regain movement and relearn everyday activities.

Physiotherapy helps stroke survivors incorporate the physical activity recommendations into their daily routine to reduce the risk of another stroke by up to 35%.

Physiotherapy improves recovery of function and mobility after stroke. NICE recommends a minimum of 45 minutes of physiotherapy up to five days a week. High intensity therapy is needed to relearn lost abilities.

Physiotherapists can provide circuit training, involving intensive repetition of everyday activities, to help people walk further, faster, with more independence and confidence.

Integrating endurance and strength training into rehabilitation reduces disability. Core stability and exercises incorporating balance, weight-shifting and gait improve balance after stroke.

Rehabilitation should continue for as long as the person is showing measurable benefit from treatment and has achieved their agreed goals.

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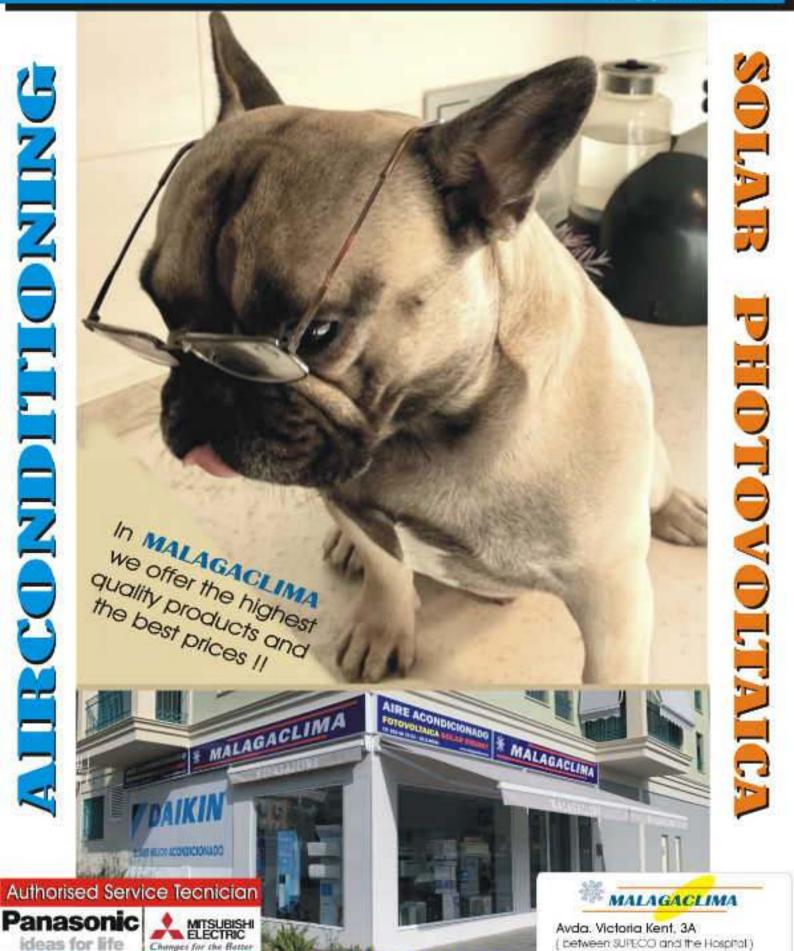


